



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Superior faces financial crisis while mayor makes cash withdrawals from town account

Really? The Mayor of Superior makes cash withdrawals of our money with a town debit card assigned to him not once, not twice, but eight times? And pays it back - some of the withdrawals were over two years ago - after a new-hire at town hall recently questioned the withdrawals in the bank statements. Are you telling me that the town clerk/ manager or the finance person didn't happen to notice the disappearing unaccounted for and undocumented money over the past two years totaling over \$2,300? Have the bank statements not been reconciled in two years? I would ask the manager and finance guy but they both abruptly quit their jobs when things heated up at town hall.

Some of you may remember we had a financial consultant set up a 5 year budget plan for the town finances in the summer of 2013. It was an endeavor that was going to be like a starvation diet plan, but made sense in getting our town finances back on track. As a business owner I shuddered because the mayor and council voted to DOUBLE the town sales tax making us among the highest in the state. That

comes out of the pocket of our Superior people who shop local (thank you) and our visitors. In order to be competitive with other towns many of us have offered "tax free" days and paid the sales taxes ourselves. Additionally, the property taxes were raised. I know that everyone who owns property felt that financial slap.

So, while the caboose restrooms were closed due to lack of money, the Senior Center and library hours were cut, light bulbs weren't being replaced, toilet paper was in short supply at the police station, dogs were running the streets, there were potholes that a small child could disappear into, and on and on and on, the Mayor was helping himself to some of our hard-earned cash.

Going back to December of 2013, the month the raise in the sales tax became effective, the town debit card (not the one assigned to the mayor) seemed to be out running the roads. Starting on Dec. 11 it began its travels at the Family Dollar in Superior and the next day wandered on down to Apache Junction, made a couple of shopping stops, then moved on to

the Dollar Tree in Mesa. The town card and its carrier (whoever that was) took the weekend off and then on Dec. 16 went to Walmart in Claypool. On the 17th there was a debit charge in, ready folks?, in Show Low and then back to the Dollar General in Globe. Total -\$1,467.85. I call this the traveling debit card. I hope all these purchases were for light bulbs and toilet paper for the town. Oh wait – we can check the receipts, if there are any.

Just take a look at Superior! There are many more people shopping at the stores on Main Street, new businesses on Highway 60, a new clinic, a beautiful historic hotel ready to open, a future mining industry, many new residents and a feeling of renewal for this spectacular

town. I care deeply about Superior and all the people who live here - you have made me feel like I'm home. Mayor and council - those of you who have lied, stolen or participated in cronyism in any way in your duties as elected officials, please resign immediately. Mayor Valenzuela, I am disappointed and ashamed of your behavior and I can't abide a liar. Residents of the town of Superior - you don't deserve, and you don't have to tolerate this behavior. I am asking you to speak up and step up. We need excellent leadership with a unified Mayor/Council in order to move forward.

- We will continue to build community pride by working with our local and regional groups and organizations to market and promote Superior as a great place to live, work, play and locate businesses. As we are marketing our community, there is much work to be done to help spruce up Superior. Together we can all pitch in to clean up our community and help our neighbors as well.
- In order to develop a well-rounded community, we must develop programs and services for all residents. Our library, swimming pool and senior center all provide important services to Superior residents. We will find ways to increase activities and better serve our community. Retaining and attracting youth is critical to our future success. I plan to implement a youth council which will further develop young leaders and ensure that the voice of our youth is heard, especially as we make decisions that will impact their future. We can utilize our community partners to fund programs throughout the community for recreation, education and job training. He has also been able to provide the Auditor General with a contingency plan preventing them from imposing additional reprimands or penalties to the Town. While these are great accomplishments, there is still much work to be done.



The Superior football team enters the 2016 season as a definite state title contender.

Last year's loss in the semifinals to Valley Union is still fresh in the mind of some players, especially the seniors who are hoping their final season playing together is their most memorable one.

Those seniors knew what they had to do in the offseason to reach the ultimate goal this year. "(The loss) pushed us even harder to advance (further)," said senior Edgar Galindo, one of the Panthers' four captains. "In order for us to get stronger we had to go to the weight room and that's what we did all summer."

Some players, including quarterback and Player of the Year candidate Nicolaus Cruz, have added as much as 20 pounds to their frames.

"(Adding the weight) is something I always should have done, honestly," Cruz told the Superior Sun. "This year I was told, especially by my dad, that I needed to put some weight on. I feel a lot better, a lot stronger, a lot faster and hopefully it helps me on the field."

After last year's defeat, Superior head coach Ryan Palmer said the most important thing his team could do to get over the hump was to get stronger. He knows his team is as talented as any, but he felt it needed more strength to compete with teams like top-ranked Bagdad. The players obviously agreed and showed up in great numbers in the weight room.

"That is one of the first places a state championship is won," Cruz said.

Increased strength and experience has Palmer optimistic that his team can accomplish its championship goal this season.

"Our biggest improvement is the core group of kids that made up a lot of our skill positions last year are all back and better," said Palmer, the reigning Coach of the Year. "They worked really hard in the offseason. They put on about 20 pounds each, I think, so anytime a kid is working that hard, and especially when you get a group of kids like that working hard together, you can't help but be optimistic about what they're going to be able to achieve this year."

About a third of the Panthers' roster is made up of seniors, most of whom, if not all, started playing



seniors looking forward to state title run

football together in elementary school. Even at that young age they aspired to be state champions and they know this year represents their last and perhaps best chance to make it happen.

"We've been trying to win a state championship since our freshman year," Galindo said. "We've been talking about this since we were little kids."

"Now it's time to put up or shut up."

The Panthers' start what they hope is a special season this Friday, Aug. 26, when they host North Phoenix Prep Academy in their home opener. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m.


