Supervisor Rios: 'ADOT does right by continuing roadside memorials'

FLORENCE - Pinal County Supervisor Pete Rios said he is pleased with the decision of the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) to continue to allow roadside memorials.

"ADOT does right by continuing roadside memorials," the District 1 Supervisor said. "This is a way families and friends remember loved ones lost in automobile or other vehicle accidents. My thanks goes to those who wrote and called ADOT and the Governor's Office to express their dissatisfaction with the removal of many of the memorial crosses. It was their action that made this policy change possible."

Supervisor Rios became the champion in the fight to keep the roadside memorials in April when he had received calls about many crosses missing from highways in parts of Gila and Pinal Counties.

"They had called because they thought that Pinal County did this," Supervisor Rios recalled. "I was as surprised as they were that those memorials went missing. So after placing some calls, I found out that it was ADOT who was doing this. There was no warning that this was going to happen."

The Supervisor sent out a press release in April alerting residents that the removal was taking place on state highways. That press release was soon picked up by statewide media and some national media outlets as well.

"Looks like many citizens were as upset as I was over this," Rios said in the overwhelming response to State authorities. "But I have lost friends who are memorialized on the side of the road. I know many, many families who have

lost loved ones in traffic accidents. This became an issue close to my heart."

"I really want to thank the ADOT Director and his staff for their willingness to work with me on this policy. They have one of the hardest jobs out there trying to keep people safe on the roads with limited resources. Their crews do great work," Supervisor Rios stressed. "But on a State-wide policy to remove of all memorial crosses, I couldn't agree with them. I appreciate them reevaluating their policy and allowing these roadside memorials to remain so long as they are not a hazard to the motoring public."

Recycling: Why, how, where, when and what

Pinal County - Most of us have seen them around the Copper Corridor: the big blue dumpsters that are reserved for materials that can and should be recycled. Surprisingly few have a clear understanding of what to do with them, so as to help the environment without getting a reprimand or fine, however, and, many of us remain confused as to why they are even needed.

Recycling helps alleviate the negative impact of consumer societies on the natural environment. When the waste by-products of our lifestyles are dumped into landfill sites where they are simply left to break down in the sun or covered over, a few very bad things happen.

Modern life brings modern joys, including lighter weight materials that are more cost-effective so that more people can afford some simple joys of life, such as a stereo, a television, furnishings, jewelry, pans and so much more. These materials can save us time, expense, the lives of animals in the case of fleece versus fur for winter warmth, but, the cost of all the good they do is the bad that results when the items made up from them are no longer of use and must be disposed of.

Harmful greenhouse gasses and dangerous

chemicals are released to leech out into the soil or pollute the air, in a way that would not happen with natural materials. Recycling helps to reduce this sort of pollution. It also helps alleviate another potential problem, which is the sheer volume of waste materials produced.


According to a brochure available online from Eco-Cycle at www.ecocycle.org nearly 90% of what we throw away could potentially be recovered through reuse, recycling or composting. Engaging in recycling can save resources, prevent pollution, support public health and create jobs.

There are many ways of recycling, by personal choice. Many artists and artisans use old magazines, clothing, broken jewelry, and much else to create new works of art or household goods. Of course, much can be donated to thrift shops to be resold, Free Cycle and Craig's List are options to help divest yourself of items that you are not sure what to do with. Repair is often an option. When it comes to recycling that goes on outside of the big blue can, the sky's the limit. What goes on inside the big blue can involves a little more following of rules, and, for good reason.

Remember all those new jobs mentioned? Well, with new jobs come new paychecks. This

is good news for those who are job seekers, but, not such great news for those who are wondering why the cost for trash removal and certain landfill sites are what they are. So, how do we get the costs down and keep them down? Primarily, by the effective sorting of trash into recyclable and non-recyclable materials, so that it takes less time for the workers at the other end of the equation to do what they need to do to help the environment.

There are recycling centers open to the public, approximately 12,000 of them nation-wide, for those who do not have the big blue can or who have recycling needs that exceed the volume it is capable of holding. For the towns of the Copper Corridor: Dudleyville, Kearny, Mammoth, Oracle and San Manuel, one place to go is the Oracle Transfer Station, 2100 E.

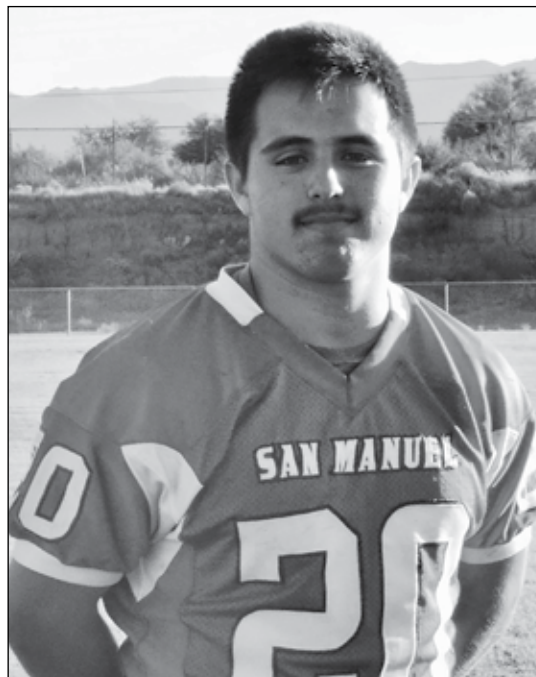

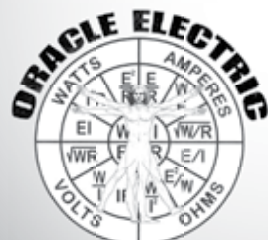

Injuries overshadow Miners' loss to Tanque Verde

Two significant injuries to a pair of San Manuel football players, including one who was transported by a helicopter ambulance, overshadowed a 39 – 13 defeat at home against Tanque Verde last Friday night.

Miner head coach Daniel Williams preferred the names of the two injured players not be released at this time. An update on their injury status will be made when and if it becomes available to the Miner.

As far as the game, the Miners didn't appear ready to play from the start, according to their head coach, despite taking scoring a go-ahead touchdown and PAT to take a 7 – 6 lead at the end of the first quarter.

"We came out really flat at the beginning," Williams told the Miner. "As the game went on, our defense didn't hold up the way we expected."

The Hawks scored 27 unanswered points in the second and third quarters combined.

Mental errors, poor technique, and missed tackles were just some of the deficiencies the Miners displayed against the Hawks. He suggested the team was just "going through the motions" at times.

Williams shouldered the blame, saying it was his and the staff's responsibility to have his team to ready to play. He said he would change some things this week in practice to

get his team back on track.

Certainly the loss of the injured players affected their teammates, a fact that Williams acknowledged had some truth, but he refused to use it as an excuse. The return this week of five players, who were ruled ineligible for the first two games, will help some attrition the Miners have experienced.

"We at least get some fresh legs out there now," he said. "That will help us out and they're key players. I think we'll be OK from here on out."

Senior running back Andrew Gomez was a key player against the Hawks as he rushed for 134 yards on 21 carries

and scored one of the Miners' two touchdowns in the game. Junior quarterback Alejandro Camacho scored the other.

Defensively, juniors Gabe Velasquez and Jose Damian each finished with a team-high eight tackles. Sophomore Julian Rodriguez, who led the Miners with 48 receiving yards, ended with seven tackles on defense. Bridger Davis, a junior, totaled six tackles and blocked a Hawks' field goal attempt.

The Miners will play their first road game this Friday at Veritas Prep. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m.

"We'll see it how it goes," Williams said. "Hopefully we'll come out with our first win."

Sea Lions host San Manuel Beast Swim Meet

Over the weekend of Aug. 27-28, swimmers from throughout Arizona came to compete in the San Manuel Beast Swim Meet. The long course meter (50 Meter Pool) meet was hosted by the Sea Lions Swim Team. The meet was a USA Swimming sanctioned meet in which any swimmer that is registered with USA Swimming could compete. There were no qualifying times and entrants who completed the three Beast Events (the 200 Meter Butterfly, the 400 Meter Individual Medley, and the 1500 Meter Freestyle) received special awards. The majority of the swimmers attending the meet were from the Tucson area, however, a few swimmers came from as far as Phoenix and Thatcher.

Twelve Swimmers completed all three Beast Events and eight of them were Sea Lions swimmers. From the Oro Valley Pirates – Sarah Seppala (10), Ava Parker (10), Xander Pollock (14), and Tim Oetter (17) completed the Beast Challenge. In some towns, there is a big blue recycling bin, instead of or in addition to the big blue cans. Pinal County Recycling bins are available Monday through Friday, from 6:30 a.m. through 2 p.m. Regardless of whether you are using bin, can or transporting recycling materials to a station, there are things you should and must not submit for recycling. These can vary from place to place and year to year, depending on budgets and capabilities of different stations. Below is a list of what can and cannot be recycled by official recycling stations of Pinal County:

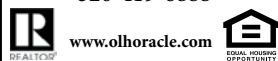

Pinal County working with college to revamp Oracle Park

A partnership with Pinal County and the University of Arizona School of Landscape Architecture and Planning

is seeking to help revamp the Oracle Park located on Parkside Street (Evergreen and Nuestro).

Last Wednesday, a small group of second-year graduate students from the School of Landscape Architecture and Planning visited the park. They asked the community

members that attended the event about what they would like to see changed, fixed and improved about the park.

According to Kent Taylor, the Open Space and Trails Director for Pinal County, these concerns combined with the insight from the students will allow the county to create a master plan for the park.

“What the master plan does is allow you to budget for those (changes) and apply to grants,” he said.

Taylor said these changes will be happening over a long term period of time.

“You’re not going to see us coming in and revamping the park all at one time, what you would see us doing is implementing those (changes) over the course of many years,” he said.

Some changes were implemented in the park in the past. The old playground equipment was taken out due to safety reasons. But the community members would like to see the park have more changes such as better parking and shade.

Frank and Kaz Pierson said they have lived within earshot of the park since 1979, and they said they love the park, but there are some things they would like to see improved.

“Any improvement on stuff for little kids would be great,” Kaz said, “and we would also love to see the water faucets turned back on.”

“For larger groups, we need more shade,” Frank said.

Kirk Dimond, an assistant professor with the U of A School of Landscape Architecture and Planning, volunteered his class for the project after hearing from the school’s director.

“Kent was in touch with a colleague of mine in planning and he forwarded on the request to our school director and she put it out to all the faculty to gauge and see how well it would fit into the class,” he said, “and my studio has three different projects we can work on throughout the semester, and it sounded it had good and had interesting aspects to it and I volunteered myself to Kent.”

This partnership helps the graduate students get real-world experience.

“We give them a certain amount of complexity before sending them off into the real world,” Dimond said.

The visit to the park was a class-project to the students not only for experience, but it was to help them meet one of their requirements for their studio course.

The students took pictures and scouted the park area to help pinpoint places where the future enhancements can be put into place. They also utilized a drone to get wider aerial shots of the park for the project.

One student who visited the park, Michael Cimino, will be coming back in Spring 2017 to help scout the park more and to work more closely with the community.

“I think my role, come next semester, will be working with the community to come up with some realistic things that can actually be implemented in the park,” Cimino said.

Cimino said he is looking forward to coming back in the spring.

“I think it will be a great opportunity for me just to interact with the community and learn more about the process and the things we do in landscape architecture,” Cimino added.
