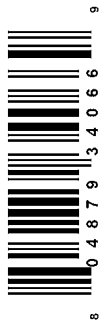

Danny C. Ramirez, 75, of Kearny, AZ was surrounded by his family when he passed away in his home on Aug. 26, 2016.

He was born on May 1, 1941 to Carmen and Gustavo Ramirez in Litchfield Park, Arizona. Danny was the fourth of six sons. He joined the US army at the age of 17 and served for four years as a paratrooper in the 101st airborne division "Screaming Eagles." Danny was honorably discharged in 1963 when he returned home to Arizona and was reacquainted with "Alice" Maria Eliza Avelar; they married on Aug. 26, 1964.

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Supervisor Rios: 'ADOT does right by continuing roadside memorials'

FLORENCE - Pinal County Supervisor Pete Rios said he is pleased with the decision of the Arizona Department of Transportation (ADOT) to continue to allow roadside memorials.

"ADOT does right by continuing roadside memorials," the District 1 Supervisor said. "This is a way families and friends remember loved ones lost in automobile or other vehicle accidents. My thanks goes to those who wrote and called ADOT and the Governor's Office to express their dissatisfaction with the removal of many of the memorial crosses. It was their action that made this policy change possible."

Supervisor Rios became the champion in the fight to keep the roadside memorials in April when he had received calls about many crosses missing from highways in parts

of Gila and Pinal Counties.

"They had called because they thought that Pinal County did this," Supervisor Rios recalled. "I was as surprised as they were that those memorials went missing. So after placing some calls, I found out that it was ADOT who was doing this. There was no warning that this was going to happen."

The Supervisor sent out a press release in April alerting residents that the removal was taking place on state highways. That press release was soon picked up by statewide media and some national media outlets as well.

"Looks like many citizens were as upset as I was over this," Rios said in the overwhelming response to State authorities. "But I have lost friends who are memorialized on the side of the road. I know many, many families

who have lost loved ones in traffic accidents. This became an issue close to my heart."

"I really want to thank the ADOT Director and his staff for their willingness to work with me on this policy. They have one of the hardest jobs out there trying to keep people safe on the roads with limited resources. Their crews do great work," Supervisor Rios stressed. "But on a State-wide policy to remove of all memorial crosses, I couldn't agree with them. I appreciate them reevaluating their policy and allowing these roadside memorials to remain so long as they are not a hazard to the motoring public."

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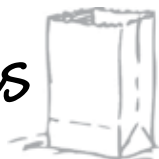
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Local resident turns 100 years young

Della Sheetz never expected to live to be one hundred years old. She was ill as a child, she suffered from chronic appendicitis. Growing old was not anything she really thought about.

“When I think about it, it seems like it all passed in a dream,” she said.

Della moved to Arizona with her husband Adam in August of 1945 from Ohio. Her first day in Arizona was one that was celebrated throughout the world, it was August 15, 1945 and it was the day that Japan surrendered the war.

“We were driving through Oak Creek Canyon on our way into Prescott,” she said. “We stopped at a well at the bottom of the canyon and that is where people were gathered sharing the news.”

For Della and her family that was a great relief. She had many family members who went away to fight in the war, and an uncle who never made it home.

“We had run out of gas in Albuquerque, New Mexico,” she said. “A nice person there gave us a gas stamp and that got us to Prescott. When we went to use our last gas stamp to fill up in Prescott, the gas station attendant told them, the gas rations are over. The war is over.”

The trip from Ohio took eight days back then, traveling only at 35 miles per hour. “Today it takes us two and a half days,” she said.

For her the scariest part of growing up was during the war.

“We had to black out our windows so no light would come out from them. It was scary and I didn’t like that one bit,” she said.

She was married to her husband Adam Sheetz for 43 years.

“My time with him was not long enough,” she said. “There was no one like him. He was wonderful. I never loved anyone else.”

Adam worked in law enforcement and as a mechanic in Ohio. When they settled in Glendale, he decided it was just too hot in the Valley so he came to Superior to work in the mines where he worked as a hoistman and eventually he went to work for the Pinal County Sheriff’s Office. He worked with Sheriff Coy DeArmann. One of her favorite stories about his career is when he rescued a monkey from under a house in Superior.

“The two little girls were just laughing and laughing,” she said. They didn’t know who to call so they called the sheriff and

Adam had to go under the neighbor’s house to rescue the pet monkey.

Della and Adam had three daughters, Ruth, Jackie and Jean, and today their family legacy has grown to 10 grandchildren and more than 100 great and great-great-grandchildren.

“Five generations are in my family. I don’t think I will see a sixth,” she said.

Della remembers the day she first came to see Superior with Adam. She recalled that there was a soap box derby race going down Magma Ave.

“I remember watching the children race the cars and one of them broke their arm. I moved to Superior officially on October 1, 1949,” she said. They lived in Superior until 1966. Adam retired and they moved to Camp Verde for a while and then she moved into the East Valley. She moved back to Superior in 2004.

Della remembers a Superior that was booming when the mines were open. She would come back to visit and see the empty buildings when the mine closed.

“It is nice to see the buildings start to have life again. The hotel (Magma Hotel) never looked that beautiful before. I am happy to see that,” she said.

She has lived through many societal changes. She remembers riding in the first car in her family which belonged to her grandfather. It was a Ford Roadster that had icing glass, which would allow the passengers to snap the glass in as needed.

She lived a life at a time when women did not have the right to vote then earned the right to vote, something many in these current times take for granted.

“I really wasn’t into voting, but my husband wanted me to vote so I registered as a Democrat until four years ago and then I changed to a Republican,” she said. “I vote for the person, not the party. I have never voted a straight ticket.”

The best innovation or advancement was “medicine and health care,” she explained. Della suffered two heart attacks and a broken hip and she explained that the doctors who took care of her prescribed her medication and carefully put her back together was something that amazed her. She did comment that kids in the past did not seem to get the illnesses and diseases they get today.

She credits her long life to good clean living. She grew up on a farm which required a lot of physical work.

“I never really drank or smoked,” she said, adding, “Well, I didn’t want my children to see me smoking so I stopped.”

Their first television was a 20-inch television that had fake wood like a naugahyde on it. “My husband would invite his friends over to watch wrestling,” she said. She wasn’t a fan of wrestling but said his friends were always gentlemen. She much preferred to watch love stories and cooking shows. She liked to watch sports; she always wanted to learn how to play golf but her husband was not a fan of “Cow Pasture Pool.” She enjoyed sewing her daughter’s clothes and shooting her .22 rifle.

Her job as a mother and wife evolved

into her working at the Murray Drugstore. She worked preparing food and ice cream treats. She enjoyed seeing the public and remembers many of the customers and longtime residents. She went on to become Pinal County’s first female dispatcher. “I kept the radio at my house and handled the calls that affected Superior and the surrounding area,” she said. She also worked as an inspector for female inmates and females visiting the jail.

She said if she had to use the internet,

Superior Police Department welcomes new officer

New Part-time Superior Police Officer Angela Gill is taking on a dual role as Town Dog Catcher and Code Enforcement.

Officer Gill has been working in law enforcement in Arizona for two years, and she has been with the Superior Police Department as a reserve for eight months. On Aug. 1, she was promoted to a part-time officer. Her main job is patrolling, but she is now also in charge of the town animal control and code enforcement programs. Officer Gill has spent much of August in training for these new positions.

The Superior Police Department took over code enforcement in December of 2015. Officer Gill says that she is "working the code enforcements in sectors. Almost like a clock, I'm working my way around the Town." Officer Gill will go around, and if she sees any violations, she will take pictures and send out a letter to the violators. In the past, there have been some issues with people saying they never received the violation letters. To address the issue, the Department now scans a copy of each letter before it gets sent out.

The property owners have 30 days to correct the issues. Gill says after she sends out the letter she will drive by and check the location two weeks later. If she sees that no progress has been made, she will tag the violation in red in her spreadsheet. If someone is working to correct the issues, Gill will give them more time, but if they haven't done anything to alleviate the issue in 30 days the violator will get a citation. Every 30 days the process restarts, which means, in theory, property owners can collect multiple citations on the same code violation issue.

For many years Superior has relied on Pinal County Animal Control to deal with animal issues, but now the town has Officer Gill. She will be working in accordance with, and alongside of, Pinal County Animal Control. Since it has been so long since the Town has used the town kennels, Gill says, "There is a lot of stuff that needs to be done before we are legally allowed to start using them again. They have to be safe for the dogs and right now they aren't."

ASU real estate, development expert speaking in Superior about proposed Resolution Copper Mine

The next meeting of the Town of Superior Community Working Group (CWG) will be held Wednesday, Sept. 14, 2016 at 6 p.m. in the Superior Chamber of Commerce meeting room. Mark Stapp, Director of the Master of Real Estate program at Arizona State University, will speak with the group about effects of the proposed Resolution Copper mine on local and area real estate values and development.



The CWG is comprised of Town of Superior, Queen Valley, and other area residents and stakeholders. The group meets regularly to talk about the social and environmental issues, science, and policy, as

well as the pros and cons of the proposed Resolution Copper Project. Topics include environmental impacts, health, safety, natural resource issues, engineering, water quantity and quality, geology, economics, air quality, community investments, recreational changes and other related subjects of community concern.

CWG meetings are held at the Superior Chamber of Commerce at 165 West Main in Superior from 6-8 p.m., most often on the second Wednesday of each month. The public is invited and time is reserved on the agenda for public comments, questions, and discussion.

to state title made more difficult after cancellation

“The news was very disappointing,” Panthers’ head coach Ryan Palmer wrote in an email to the Superior Sun. “We tried to move some other games around, but unfortunately it was too late of notice.”

The cancelled game will negatively affect the Panthers in more ways than one. First, they now have seven scheduled games, one less than most other teams, which will affect their power-points ranking.

“It will hurt us, and everyone in our region, because it was a region game,” Palmer explained. “Power points will

be bad news for everyone in the region now, only having seven games and playing against teams with only seven games. This takes away a lot of points and will put the East at a huge disadvantage.”

Palmer said the end result could mean his team would be seeded fourth or fifth in the state playoffs – even if they go undefeated – instead of a likely first or second seed if they won all eight originally scheduled games.

Another consequence is the Panthers will only have three home games this season, the first on Sept. 9 versus St.

David.

“Needless to say we are not happy about it, but it is out of our control,” Palmer said.

Superior will finally play their first game of the season this Friday at Valley Lutheran, where they figure to take the frustration of last week out on the Flames.

“The kids will look forward to hitting some opposite color jerseys this week,” Palmer wrote in the email.

No doubt.

Friday’s kickoff at Valley Lutheran is scheduled for 7 p.m.

When a stray is found Gill does not have a chip reader, but she tries to find the owner. When she does find the owner, she will issue a citation if the animal doesn’t have its tags and vaccinations.

Besides the conditions of the kennels, the challenge, Gill says, is that she only works 20 hours a week. She stated, “You can’t leave the animals in the kennels unsupervised.” She will have to transport the animals to Florence and from there they are transported to Pinal County Animal Control.

Since the Town of Superior is under the restrictions of Pinal County Animal Control, every dog in town needs to

be licensed, registered and vaccinated through Pinal County. Officer Gill says if a dog gets out and it doesn’t have tags, “Pinal County will not release the animal until they have licensed and vaccinated the animal, so if they want their dog back they will have to, on the spot, pay to have it vaccinated, or the animal will not be released to them.”

According to Town Hall, the contract the town has with Pinal County calls for twice a year dog round ups and twice a year vaccinations and license clinics in town. The last clinic was held in Superior in April, and the next one has yet to be scheduled.

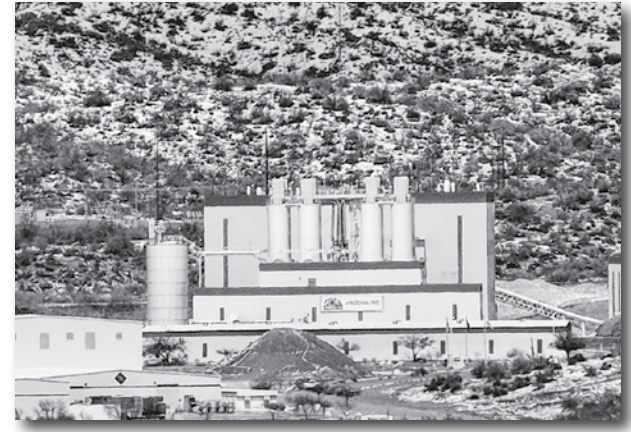

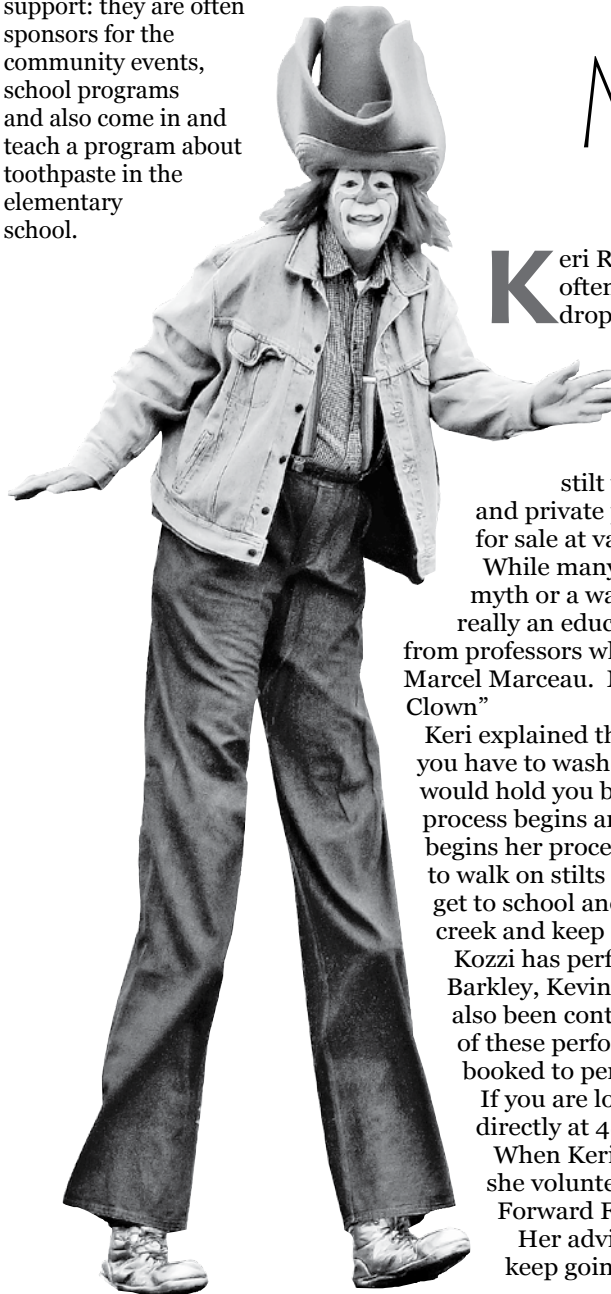

Lifeline assistance is provided by Wireless LLC, d/b/a Access Wireless, an eligible telecommunications carrier. Lifeline service is non-transferable. Lifeline benefits are limited to one per household. A household is defined, for the purposes of the Lifeline program, as any individual or group of individuals, who live together at the same address and share income and expenses. WHEREAS, by the provisions of State law, the ordinance levying taxes for fiscal year 2016-17 is required to be finally adopted not later than the third Monday in August; and

Firehouse Subs donates wildland vehicle to Queen Valley FD

Since the beginning of the Queen Valley Fire District in 1987, there have been numerous calls for emergency medical as well as wildland fires that couldn't be reached by the department's current vehicles. The number of patients that did not survive due to inaccessibility cannot be confirmed but their chances of survival would have been greater with a fully equipped off-road all-terrain vehicle (ATV).

In December 2015 Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation awarded the district with a grant in the amount of \$23,418 to purchase a fully equipped ATV for wildland fires and search and rescue. This ATV will allow a crew to access the difficult to reach areas around Queen Valley. It is equipped with water and tools to tackle wildland brush fires and hopefully contain them before too much land is destroyed. It is also equipped with medical apparatus to safely bring patients to an area that is reachable by Ambulance or helicopter for transport to a hospital.
