Mammoth clerk addresses concerns raised by residents

Mammoth Residents,

In response to Editorials published in the San Manuel Miner on July 23, 2014 from DeAnna Martinez, Joseph Brewer and Donald Jones .

1. DeAnna Martinez Letter - Complaint made about treatment of Mammoth Librarian

- I did not "scream, curse or reprimand" Ms. Miller.
- In a calm, low tone, I advised Ms. Miller that if she ever goes over my head again she should have another job lined up because I am not going to put up with this anymore.
- Ms. Miller stated that if the children heard what I said, it went right over their heads and there were no "ohhh" or "burn" as state in Ms. Martinez's complaint.
- I contacted Ms. Theobald, who was standing immediately behind me, asking what she heard me say to Ms. Miller. She said "nothing", but she could tell that it was disturbing by the look on Letha's face. I asked her again "Are you sure you didn't hear what I said?" Again her reply was "no".

2. Joseph S. Brewer Letter - Lack of 2013 audit explained to Mammoth residents.

a. The incomplete audit for 2013 is due to the lack of information requested by the auditors to complete the audit for the fiscal year 2011-12. This information is needed before the auditors can move forward to complete the 2013 audit. The fiscal year in question ended June 30, 2012. I was hired by the Mammoth Town Council in June 2012. Please recall that when I became Interim Manager/Clerk I was faced with the following issues that had a bearing on the recovery of this information:

* The computer was wiped clean of documents that would have been beneficial in the transition process from one administration to the other.

* Passwords were not available to access the computer programs.

A great deal of office hours has been expended in an attempt to locate the requested information.

b. "Undocumented credit card charges":

Mr. Brewer requested only copies of the credit card bank statements. He did not ask for document supporting charges. If Mr. Brewer would have requested the back-up documents he would have found:

1. The Lego Shop at Home was a charge made prior to my

being hired. It was a charge made by the past librarian, Diana Sterling, for a summer reading program. This was funded by grant monies. This is also true with meals charged by the library. Ms. Sterling purchased meals and snacks for the guest speakers and for the children in the reading program. Again this was reimbursed to the Town from grant monies.

2. Grocery store - There are occasional purchases made to vendors for items such as water and Gatorade for the public work employees. We want to keep them hydrated as they do work in the hot sun.

3. Restaurants. We have council members and staff who travel for Town business and are entitled to having their meals paid. We also have a policy that we pay for meals when the auditors are here. We also pay for the meals of the election workers when working the Town's elections, and the Town purchased \$5 pizzas for the first teen night of the years at the pool.

c. Over a MILLION DOLLARS unaccounted for.

I don't know how Mr. Brewer arrived at the figures stated in his letter. It is difficult to respond to such allegations given the

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The Arizona State Militia


While covering the protest held on the road to Peppersauce, I observed a group of men wearing matching black shirts, khaki pants, caps and dark glasses observing the crowd. I approached some of the men and asked them if I could take their photograph. They pointed me to a bearded man and said I needed to ask him. I assumed he was the leader of the group. I introduced myself and asked him his name. He responded, "Colonel Kratos." I knew he was no colonel at least in the military sense and something told me his name was not Kratos.

Colonel Kratos told me the group was part of the Arizona State Militia and they were there as security and nothing more. He would not let me know who they were providing security for but after watching the news and looking at photographs of the protest it appeared they were there watching over Russell Pearce and Gubernatorial candidate Frank Riggs who Pearce has endorsed.

I became curious about what the militia was doing there and their relationship to Pearce. You would think Pearce would have distanced himself from these groups after his friend J.T. Ready, an avowed Neo-Nazi and leader of vigilante militia patrols in the Vekol Valley area of Pinal County, murdered four innocent people before killing himself. Then there is Shawna Forde on death row for killing a man and his 9-year-old daughter. Shawna and two men had planned to rob the home to provide financing for the Minuteman American Defense (MAD) group of which she was a leader. Chris Simcox founder of the Minuteman Civil Defense Corps has been arrested for child molestation. What is scary about this is that Ready and Simcox

have ties to important Republican politicians. Pearce is the first vice chairman of the Republican Party and Maricopa County Attorney Bill Montgomery once supported Simcox and the Minutemen.

I am not saying that the Arizona State Militia are white supremacists, in fact on their website they say that racism or discrimination based on race, sex or ethnicity will not be tolerated. Yes, they have a website and are on Facebook and I am saddened or horrified to say they have more "likes" than Copper Area Newspapers does.

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A warning to drivers, Pinal will prosecute 'stupid motorists'

Florence – Pinal County Attorney Lando Voyles reminds drivers to drive safely during this monsoon season and to abide by all warning signs, especially on roads closed due to flooding.

Nearly a year ago, on July 28, a Las Vegas-bound tour bus, carrying over 30 people, became stranded in a flash flood near Dolan Springs. We find ourselves in the middle of monsoon season with thunderstorm warnings and heavy rainfall totals building up in short amounts of time.

Even if driving into a flooded area does not cost the operator their life, it may cost them financially. Arizona's "stupid motorist law," ARS 28-910, allows prosecutors to

seek restitution of up to \$2,000 for expenses related to an emergency response by a private or public agency to rescue occupants or remove a vehicle made inoperable due to flooding.

Two conditions allow for this law to apply: if the individual drove the vehicle on a public street or highway that is barricaded because of flooding and temporarily covered by a rise in water-level; or, if the driver is convicted of reckless driving, ARS 28-693, showing a reckless disregard for the safety of persons or property by driving a vehicle into any area that is temporarily covered by a rise in water-level.

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Three Pinal County school districts are seeking override extensions in Nov. 4 election

Three school districts in Pinal County will be asking voters to approve tax overrides to support their maintenance and operations budgets on Nov. 4.

Both the Oracle Elementary School District and the Superior Unified School District has filed for 15 percent overrides while the Ray Unified

School District based in Kearny is seeking a 10 percent override. Under Arizona law, individual school districts can seek voter approval through property taxes additional funding equivalent to up to 15 percent more than

is allocated in the state budget approved by the state legislature.

Of the three districts, the most energized is the Oracle Elementary School District, which in 2013 came only 52 votes short of approving a 15 percent

override.

“Oracle needs the full override funding to maintain the current level of instructional programs. Since the heartbreaking loss in 2013 we had to trim the budget by nearly \$154,000 for the upcoming

school year and, without a reauthorization of the 15 percent override we might have cut deeper, which would affect some of educational programs,” said Dennis Blausier, superintendent of Oracle Elementary.

To put the override over the top this year, the district is casting a wider net in search of voters. Pitches for the override have already been delivered before a meeting of the local Republican and Democrat parties and to the local Rotary Club. An independent political action committee called SOS (Support Our Schools) has been organized by citizen Jana Looby that is currently fundraising to support efforts to promote the override in the fall.

“We will be canvassing door to door, making phone calls and passing

out leaflets to get the word out that without reauthorization of the full 15 percent override some educational programs might be lost,” Looby said. “We’ll be meeting with church and other groups, with special emphasis on the SaddleBrooke and SaddleBrooke Ranch communities where we feel the extra votes can be found.”

“Every effort to broaden support for Oracle schools will be attempted,” Blausier promised.

Blausier emphasized that approval of the override is simply a continuation of the existing override so there will be no increase in property taxes. The school part of the local property tax is only about 24 cents per \$100,000 of property valuation.

Superior Unified School District (SUSD) is likewise seeking continuation of its existing 15 percent override.

“We are in our fifth year of the current override, so we are going to the voters to keep it 15 percent,” said SUSD Superintendent Patrick O’Donnell.


“Otherwise beginning in 2015 we’ll have to start trimming the maintenance and operations budget.”

Under Arizona law, overrides are authorized by voters for only seven years. If not approved for another full term after the fifth year, the tax override is reduced by one-third in the sixth year, two-thirds in the seventh year, and reaches zero in the eighth year.

To promote approval of the override referendum, at least one citizens group has been formed to take

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State releases school letter grades – how did the Copper Corridor Schools fare?

Just as students receive report cards tracking their progress throughout a school year, so too do schools receive grades.

The Arizona Department of Education assigns each school district and each school within the district a letter grade A-F based on the weighting of student performance on the AIMS tests and student academic growth from year to year, along with additional points for high English Language Learner reclassifications and significant reductions in dropout rates. This report card reflects the school's and district's annual academic profile.

Approximately 75 more schools across the state earned "A" letter grades when compared to last year. At the same time, the number of schools receiving a grade of B, C, or D fell. "The majority of Arizona schools are doing quite well," said Superintendent of Public Instruction John Huppenthal Monday at a press conference. Sixty-five percent of schools are receiving A or B labels. "Arizona's schools are improving. In fact, we found over 20% schools improved a letter grade over last year," he said.

Among the Copper Corridor school districts, one showed improvement over 2013, two maintained the same grades and two dropped a letter grade. District grades are an average of the school grades.

Hayden-Winkelman Unified School District brought 2013's "D" up a letter grade to a "C." Winkelman Elementary School dropped its overall grade from a "C" last year to a "D" this year. Leonor Hambly Middle School (Hayden Junior High) showed improvement, bringing its 2013 "D" to a "C." Hayden High School maintained its "C."

Ray Unified School District and Oracle Elementary School District maintained their letter grades from 2013. Both are sporting "C" averages.

In the Ray District, Ray Elementary School (K-6) dropped its "C" grade from 2013 to a "D" in 2014. Ray Junior-Senior High School last year was given two grades,

one for the junior high and one for the senior high.

Both schools were awarded a "C" and this year, though combined, maintained that grade.

In the Oracle School District, only one school is graded, Mountain Vista School (Oracle Ridge School is a kindergarten only school and is not tested; it received only a "Pass" grade). Mountain Vista kept its "C" grade from 2013.

Mammoth-San Manuel Unified School District and Superior Unified School District both dropped a letter grade overall. Mammoth-San Manuel dropped from a "B" last year to a "C" this year, while Superior dropped from a "C" to a "D."


Two schools within the M-SM School District contributed to the district's grade drop, San Manuel Junior High and, surprisingly, Mammoth Elementary STEM School. SMJHS's grade dipped to a "D" while the MESS grade slipped from a "B" to a "C." First Avenue Elementary and San Manuel High School remained static at "C."

Superior School District was the only school in the Copper Corridor to receive a "D" grade overall, which overshadows the fact it has the only high school in the area to receive a "B," an improvement over last year's "C." John F. Kennedy Elementary School's grade dropped from its 2013 "C" to a "D" while Superior Junior High saw no improvement over last year's "D."

The Copper Corridor's only charter school, Sierra Oaks Community School (which announced in May that it would be closing its doors) also saw an improvement

over the previous year. In 2013, the school's overall grade was a "D." This year's grade was a "C." Officials from Sierra Oaks cited a lack of enrollment and state funding as the cause for the school's demise.

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

Sun Life Family Health Centers participated in a training exercise with local fire departments Monday, July 28. The training took place at both the San Manuel and Oracle facilities. It is part of Sun Life preparing their staff to be ready in case there is ever an emergency incident or disaster at one of their facilities. "Safety is my number one focus," said Al Gutierrez. "In every position I have had, safety has always been a priority."

Al praised his staff in charge of safety at the health centers, Oscar Flores in San Manuel and Jennifer Sanchez in Oracle. "They are so amazing in what they do," he said. He said that Oscar has been working with Tri-City Med, San Manuel Fire and the Oracle Fire Department and putting a safety plan together.

The training exercise was first held at the San Manuel Sun Life Health Center and in the afternoon at the Oracle

Sun Life facility. The simulated disaster was a water heater explosion with injuries of some staff members. Oscar and Jennifer acted as incident commanders and made sure staff and patients were evacuated in a timely manner. They briefed the first responders upon their arrival about what had happened. The firefighters then entered the facilities and cleared each building making sure everyone was out of the building including the injured that were then treated by EMTs and paramedics. The exercise received good evaluations.

The training is the first in what will be more simulations to prepare staff in case there should ever be a disaster at one of the facilities. The training brings together first responders who also become familiar with the facilities and the staff they may be working with in responding to an emergency. At the debriefing Al Gutierrez thanked the first responders for what they do and for their participation. He said, "We are a very, very safe facility and care about the safety of our patients and staff."

support veterans, troops and military families.

Although the current crisis with the VA has helped to shed light on some of the issues that veterans face on a daily basis, in reality, the VA system has been troubled for decades.

One Pinal veteran stated, "This is an opportunity to change things, to make things right at the VA. But only if those in charge will listen, take action and do what's right for the men and women who have served with such dedication and courage."

Despite the problems with the VA, exciting things are happening around Pinal County that will benefit veterans and military families directly in the communities closest to where veterans live.

For the past year and half, Sonnette Chaput has worked tirelessly with the VetCorps and the Pinal Hispanic Council in association with Honoring/Helping/Honoring our Heroes (HOHP) to identify needs of Pinal County Veterans in order to connect them with resources.

Chaput has helped to develop a Veteran Service Directory that lists services state and countywide. The directory is 185 pages long and is available to any organization by calling 520-423-4255.

"We have definitely seen an increase in the number of veterans who are needing and or requesting assistance. We want to be available to assist each and every one of them," stated Chaput.

According to the Veterans' Administration website, there are roughly 26,000 veterans in Pinal County, with

approximately 40 percent using VA services. The other 60 percent either does not require services or have not come forward.

HOHP has been working to connect Veteran organizations in Pinal County and has successfully hosted two "Arizona Stand Downs" for the regional area, in 2013 and 2014. According to Chaput, 125 veterans were assisted with services in 2013 and 189 in 2014. A "Stand Down" is an outreach event that assists and connects veterans with shelter, services, healthcare, employment services.

Together, Chaput, HOHP and the Pinal County Attorney's office hosted the county's first Veterans Stakeholder Forum in October 2013, during which over 87 organizations took part in and discussed critical issues facing veterans in Pinal County.

Critical issues included how to support and service new veterans returning from the Middle East, employment, mental health, homelessness, transportation, family and financial issues and suicide prevention. A second Veterans' Resource Forum is scheduled for Oct. 2014 at the Ak-Chin Casino, exact time and dates will be released soon.

In addition, a new Veterans' Center will be opening in Eloy and Casa Grande, and the push is on for a similar center in San Tan Valley by the American Legion Post 97.

According to Alan Pease, past commander and founder of Post 97, the group plans to reach out to returning veterans who are choosing to settle in the area or who are returning to families.

Pease stated, "One of the most critical and pressing areas where we need help right now is with community volunteers. We need people to step forward all over the county to assist our veterans who are returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. These are younger veterans who may have served in three or four tours and need assistance with re-entry and the transition back to civilian life."

Many veterans face dual issues, especially when living in rural areas, like Pinal County. Often times, veterans don't know where to turn, services are not available, there is a long wait time or the veteran gives up.

"Veterans who live in Pinal County have to travel to Gilbert, Phoenix or Tucson, which is an added strain. There is a great need for a Veteran's Center in Pinal County," stated Ted Eckman, an Army Veteran, and member of American Legion Post 97. Eckman lives in San Tan Valley and was a Chief Warrant Officer in Military Intelligence. He is also President of the Encanterra Veterans' Club.

"It's ok for those of us who can travel, but those who are struggling, they are the ones we need to serve, assist and take care of," said Eckman.

There are many tragic stories of veterans who return home and don't get assistance they need.

One only needs to read the story of Corporal, USMC Ira Hayes, one of Pinal County's bravest, to be reminded of why the people of Pinal County should do everything possible to take care of the men and women who protect our great country; every single one.

the message to citizens throughout the district. A major tool of his group is a slide show promoting the value of education and how it benefits the community – and how cutbacks in

instruction programs can have an adverse effect – that will be presented at church and other meetings. “Approval of the override also will help SUSD modify its loss of \$69,000 in

Title 1 funds, provided as a federal grant to help students needing help in mastering reading,” O’Donnell said. He added that if the additional funding to school recently

ordered by Maricopa County Judge Katherine Cooper were forthcoming, Superior would get an additional \$75,000 in state funding, which also would cover the Title 1 loss.

Approval of the override will keep the schools’ share of the local property tax at \$1.34 per \$100,000 property valuation.

The Ray Unified School District in Kearny is asking voters to approve a 10 percent tax override in November to keep from having to trim its budget and educational programs. A spokesperson for the

district said Ray officials have studied how school districts in Miami and Casa Grande promoted their override referendum to victory in 2013 and will try to do likewise.

Approval of the Ray override will keep the schools’ share of the local property tax at \$1.06 per \$100,000 property valuation.

The \$2,000 liability may be excluded by insurance policies and would be in addition to and not a limit of any other liability that may be imposed.

lives, the lives of their occupants and that of those first responders charged with rescuing them. 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Superior's Prickly Pear Festival scheduled for Aug. 23

Celebrate the lore, the flavors and the challenges of gathering Arizona's iconic prickly pears at the third annual Prickly Pear Festival on Saturday, Aug. 23, in the historic and picturesque old mining town of Superior.

Visitors to the festival, the only all-day event of its kind in the country, will learn to identify the most edible of the hundreds of prickly pears in the state, gather and prepare the luscious purple fruit and the nutritious green pads. Experts will guide visitors in how to turn the pears into tasty salads, entrees and desserts, brew a light melony pale ale and make wine and mead from the fruit.

One of the walks will be a tour of Old Pinal City, led by Tonto National Forest Ranger Scott Wood, an expert on the history of the area and its native foods and people. The firemen's breakfast, on the patio of Porter's Cafe, on Main Street, will be served from 7 to 11 a.m. and will include ham, eggs, pancakes with prickly pear syrup, juice, milk and coffee—all for a suggested donation of \$6. Proceeds benefit the firefighters.

Speakers at the festival include Jean Groen, the cookbook author and famed "cactus lady" who conducts regular programs at the nearby Boyce Thompson Arboretum; Natalie McGee, of the Arizona Cactus Ranch in Green Valley, a nationally known advocate for the amazing health benefits



attributed to the plant, and Gabriel Garfio, a young executive chef whose culinary creations at his Mesa restaurant incorporate prickly pears in both traditional Mexican and Native American dishes and today's Mediterranean diet.

In the potable area, Pete Rendek, Chandler, will repeat his popular three-hour class in brewing prickly pear India pale ale. Globe winemaker Jerry Temanson will talk about making wine from the prickly pear fruit and Randy Childers, of Gold Canyon, will reveal the secrets to making a modern Southwest version of the ancient drink mead from honey and prickly pear fruit. Tasting samples will be available to try all three.

Reservations and a \$25 fee are required for the prickly pear ale brewing class; all other festival events are free. Register for the brew class by calling Lynn Heglie, at Porter's Cafe, 520-827-9398. Spaces are limited.

Desert food specialists, crafters and artists will offer a unique assortment of wares, from prickly pear lip balm, handmade jewelry and photographs to juices, syrups, jams and an array of desert and prickly pear-based products.

Local restaurants will add special items featuring the fruit, or "tunas," or the pads, "napoles," to their menus on festival day, and downtown shops will offer discounts to festival goers.

For those who want to arrive early or stay late, the Copper Mountain Motel, on Hwy. 60, is offering discounted stays to guests on both Friday and Saturday nights.

The event will run from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. (the hikes are earlier) on Main Street in Downtown Superior. The first 100 visitors to register at the Chamber of Commerce office, 165 Main St., will receive a free prickly pear pad.

Superior is located off Hwy. 60, about an hour east of Phoenix and three miles east of the Boyce Thompson Arboretum.
