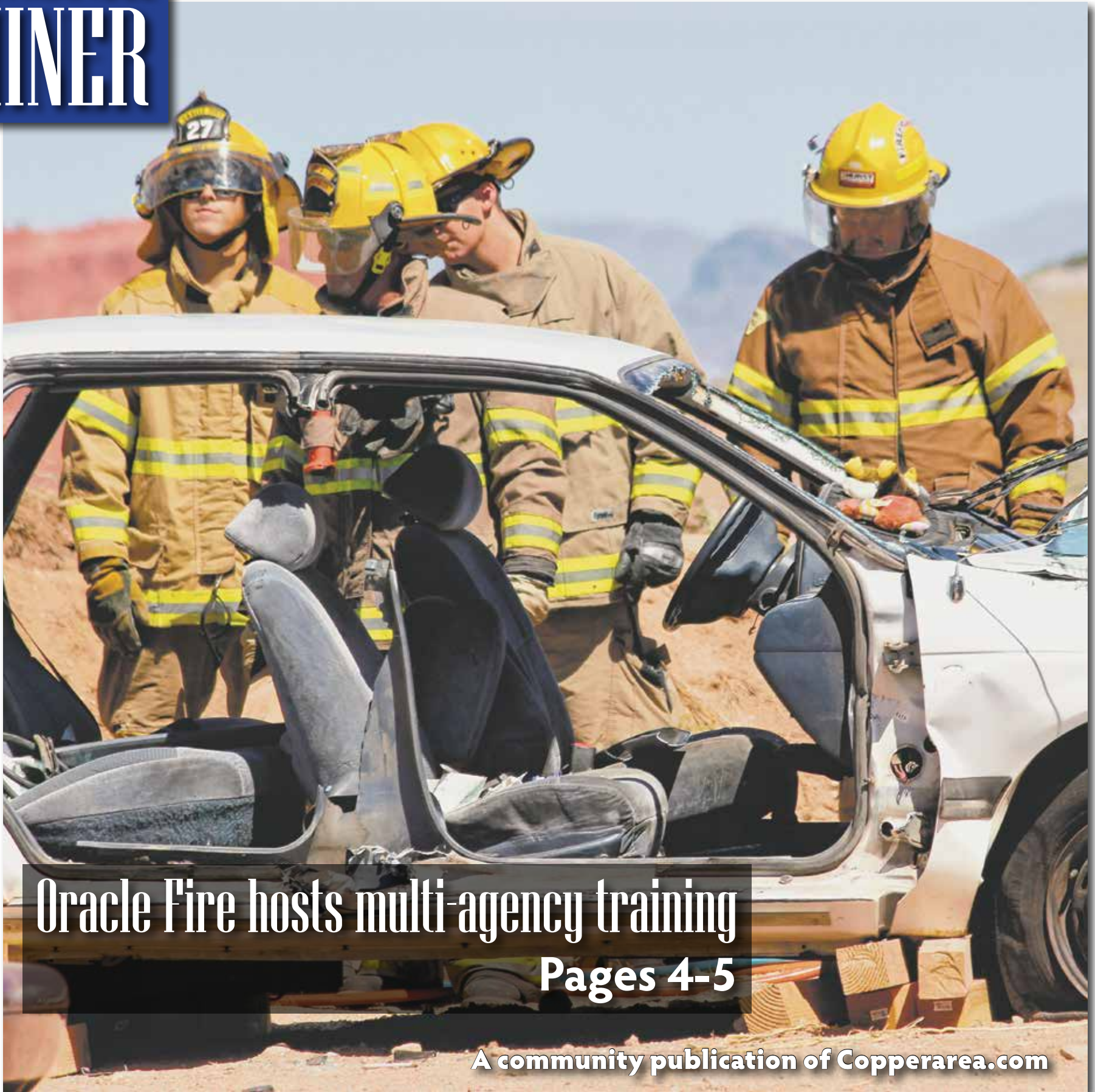
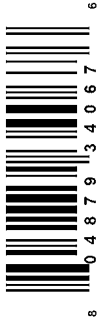

Abe Auerbach Memorial Blood Drive October 1

Abe Auerbach, a resident of Oracle from 1980 until his death Jan. 14, 2014, was a dedicated blood donor. So happy that he was a "universal donor" (having type O - negative, a blood group anybody could use, no matter what their type), he donated every chance he got — and bragged about it.

Therefore to honor him, his widow Evaline Auerbach is sponsoring a community blood drive through Red Cross on Oct. 1, which would have been his 89th birthday. It is from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at Trowbridge Hall — behind the Oracle Union Church at the junction of American Avenue and Mt. Lemmon Highway (turn in at the community center sign).

Abe gave 50 pints between June 30, 1998, and July 28, 2009—an "amazing" amount, says the Red Cross. That would mean that 70% of the time that he was eligible, he gave. He had donated many more pints before 1998 but the Red Cross hadn't started keeping track of individual donations until then. After mid-2009, he was required to stop because of the medications he had to take for his heart failure. One of Abe's chief complaints about being sick was that he couldn't give blood anymore.

If you can give, please call Evaline at (520) 610-8742 to sign up for a specific time and/or to ask questions about eligibility. Of course, you can always show up on the morning of Oct. 1 and sign up or ask questions - or just to visit. If you can't give blood but want to make a donation to the Red Cross in Abe's name, please bring it by - or call the number given to find where to send it.

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Oracle, other local agencies train

To the casual observer, it might have seemed like a demolition derby or wrecking crew had descended upon the desert area west of the San Manuel Junction. Many cars had been cut open like tin cans, the remains of the vehicles piled inside what remained of the chassis.

It wasn't a demolition, though. It was a training exercise meant to teach first responders how to do difficult extrications.

"As emergency responders," said Oracle Fire Chief Larry Southard, "training is one of the most important things we can do. In an effort to always be ready for the next

emergency, we train over and over again."

It was also an exercise meant to teach first responders how to work with each other regardless of their home agency.

"Training is most often done within our own agencies and it is usually performed in small groups," Chief Southard told the *San Manuel Miner*. "However, it's also important to occasionally train with neighboring agencies so we can become more proficient while working together on a large incident."

More than 80 First Responders were involved in the extrication training. Agencies involved included Oracle (which hosted the event), Mammoth, San Manuel and Golder Ranch fire departments, Pinal Fire and Medical, Mammoth

Police Department, AMR (American Medical Response, formerly Southwest Ambulance), Pinal County Sheriff's Office, PCSO Sheriff's Posse and PCSO Search & Rescue. Lifenet and Native Air were also involved, but in the afternoon exercise only. Oracle CERTs organized and managed the entire training. Luis Lopez from the Carniceria Rancheros Market in Mammoth donated 80 pounds of meat for the event and then spent the morning grilling it over a wood fire on his special grill. (This reporter has to mention how wonderfully flavorful the chicken was. Luis, you're the best.)

The afternoon training included a scenario with a burning vehicle, a rollover accident with "victims" and a high-angle rescue from a vehicle that had fallen into a ravine. Oracle CERTs and the children of Oracle Fire Assistant Chief Robert Jennings served as the "victims."

Oracle CERTs and firefighters not involved in the afternoon scenario heard the dispatcher announce that there was a multi-vehicle accident on Mine Road near San Manuel. The dispatcher reported that there were multiple victims including children.

San Manuel Fire Department was first

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on the scene and they began assessing the patients. AMR paramedics arrived next followed quickly by Oracle Fire Department. Two helicopters were dispatched from the home heliport in Marana.

Jennings' wife (and the mother of the "victims") was sitting with the observers. She said that even though she knew it wasn't real, it was still hard to watch her children being treated as accident victims.

One of the vehicles involved in the accident caught fire (due to safety issues, this was simulated by setting a fire just in front of the engine compartment of the

vehicle). San Manuel Fire Department doused the flames.

A call was dispatched to First Responders that one of the children was missing, ejected from the rollover accident and officers and firefighters immediately began searching for the child. He was located several hundred feet from the accident and was triaged by paramedics. He was eventually placed on a backboard and gurney and loaded into the back of the ambulance.

First Responders received another radio call, this time a relay from Pinal County Search and Rescue about two more victims

trapped in a vehicle at the bottom of a ravine. Rescuers had to descend to the bottom of the ravine on ropes, extricate the victims from the rollover accident and transport them by basket up the steep incline to the waiting paramedics.

"Very few emergency responder agencies can afford to staff and equip for large incidents," Chief Southard explained, "and when those large incidents occur, we often call upon our neighbors for assistance. Although we assist each other under various written Mutual Aid Agreements, it's really more like neighbor helping neighbor."

This drill was the second one held for multiple agencies, Jennings said, noting that each one gets bigger and bigger. He was pleased to see so many of the firefighters from the different agencies interacting with each other.

"Collaborating with other agencies is a critical component of providing emergency services, and joint training exercises such as the one we're doing here today helps to build strong working relationships," Chief Southard said. "This training exercise will help each of our agencies bond together so we can work effectively and efficiently as a single team."

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Miner swimmers qualify for state

Miner swimmers had a busy week. First they traveled to Florence on Thursday, Sept. 15, to compete against Florence High School and Arete Prep in a triangular meet and then on Saturday, Sept. 17, they attended the Wolves Classic Invitational at Chandler High School which was the first opportunity to post qualifying times for the State Championship meet to be held on Nov. 5.

On Thursday, the Boys' Team did not have enough swimmers at the meet to put together a relay team (4 swimmers are required), but they did put together some good swims winning 4 out of the 8 individual events. Robert Sweeney won both the 200 and 500 Freestyle. Colbey Stratton won both the 50 Free and 100 Butterfly. The scores for the Boys' Meet were Arete Prep 69, Florence

High School 42 and San Manuel High School 32.

The scores for the Girls' Meet were Arete Prep 75, San Manuel High School 50 and Florence High School 38. All three teams had some great swimmers. Outstanding sophomores Darien Apuron and Gianna Sweeney won the only races for the Miners. Apuron won the 100 Butterfly and Sweeney won the 100 Breaststroke.

On Saturday the Miners' primary goal was for swimmers to experience swimming in big swim meet and to post times that would get them qualified for the Division III State Championship Meet. Over 1,300 swimmers from over 50 teams competed at the meet. Miner swimmers showed that they were not intimidated by the size of

the meet and nearly every Miner swimmer swam personal best times. Darien Apuron swam times that will qualify her for the State Championship Meet in the 100 Butterfly and 100 Backstroke. Gianna Sweeney swam School Record times in the 200 Individual Medley (2:23.19) and 100 Breaststroke (1:12.93) to ensure she also will be swimming at the State Championship. Sweeney's 100 freestyle leadoff leg time of 59.07 in the 400 Freestyle Relay broke the school record previously held by Darien Apuron. Seniors Colbey Stratton and Robert Sweeney swam times that will be close qualifying times, since the fastest 24 swimmers compete at the State Championship, the final qualifiers will not be known until early November.

The Miner Relays showed a lot of promise

and have a good chance of making the qualifying cuts. The Boys 400 Freestyle Relay has always been one of the strengths of Miner Swimming, and the team of Robert Sweeney, Michael Primero-Predgo, Michael Garcia, and Colbey Stratton swam a time of 3:55.94 which may already be fast enough to qualify. Since this year only 16 relay teams will qualify, Coach Alex Gort feels that Miners will go faster as the season progresses. "The team has higher expectations than just qualifying that relay. When medals are being awarded, they want to be on the podium receiving them," he said.

The Miners will host The Gregory School and Immaculate Heart High School in a triangular Meet on Thursday, Sept. 22, at 4 p.m.

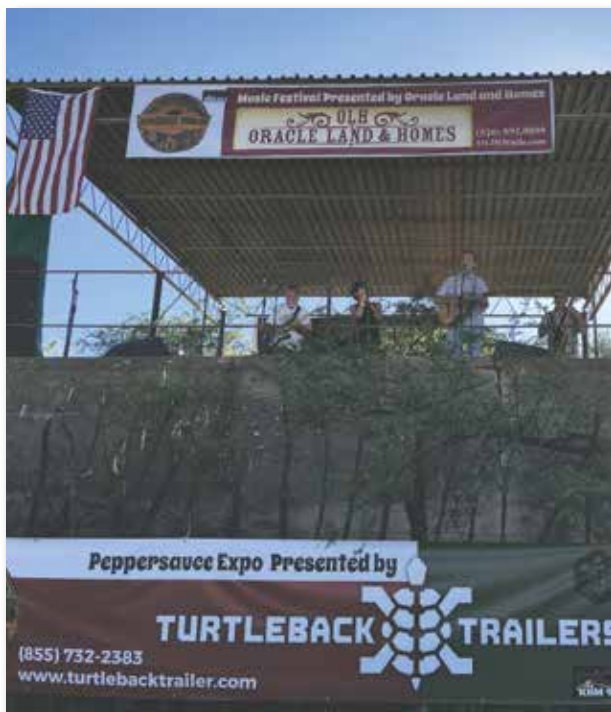
