Resident concerned about Mammoth Council meeting

Mammoth Town Meeting: The town meeting started as usual, led by the Mayor. As usual, no PWD report on water and sewer conditions, and, what the PWD has accomplished for the month.

There was no report on the meat market and the six-month on going renovation financed by the Town; no date when the opening is scheduled or how many man hours were used, and

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what this building has cost the townspeople. Or, what line-item in the Town budget the funding is budgeted from.

The reason we do not know these answers is there is never a financial statement given. I understand we are paying a wage to the Town clerk for this job, but, we never receive a financial report. It looks to me that the Town is paying for a dead horse here.

After the Mayor skipped over several items on the agenda, the new water system was talked about. It was stated by the engineer that papers were not filled out correctly and a

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\$300.000 grant was lost. As I understand it, this grant was to backup another \$300,000 grant and to act like a down payment. The process looks to be lost at this time due to mismanagement. My experience with grant writing is there must be a financial statement and, with a town like Mammoth, a complete audit.

To use grant funding for other than what it was requested for is illegal. To use grant funding for any other line item in the town is illegal. I am wondering how many funds are left from the first \$250.000 grant the town received?

The Mayor stated the past Town Council and Town clerk got rid of all records and it was impossible to give an audit. My answer to this is all bank records are available and a forensic audit would find this information out. Where are the old computers with the past records? The computers can be opened and all information revealed. There is no excuse for not retrieving all records. The bottom line is if the Town Council and Mayor wanted these records they could be obtained. What is needed is accounts payable, receivables, and all bank statements. A new audit could be completed. I have been there and done that! There are no excuses for poor management.

The Town Librarian gave a good report and has new programs in line for the Town Library. I see that she is doing her best to improve the Town's Library.

The Town Planning and Zoning Chairman gave a good report about ongoing issues and a new member was sworn in as Council member.

There were no motions brought to the floor from any member of the council. Nothing to improve the Town or the well being of the Towns people.

Councilman Brewer gained the floor and was quickly told by the Mayor to be quiet but he remained on the subject and the Mayor threatened to have him removed. The Mayor was drowned out from the audience and shrunk down in his seat. Councilman Brewer continued and asked his questions.

Finally the acting Police Chief Nash was demoted from the police chief job and officer Macintosh was reinstated as Mammoth Police Chief. It seems to me the police officers ' Come and go like the tide here in Mammoth'...

Speaking out against the proposed Pinal Rural District

The supporters of the proposed Pinal Rural Fire Rescue and Medical District (PRFR&MD) are presently attempting to gather enough petition signatures to establish their district. As residing property owners of this proposed district, we strongly oppose its formation and urge others not to sign the petition. Below are some of the reasons for our opposition.

(1) As stated in a previous letter to the editor (August 13, 2014), this proposed district would significantly raise our property taxes. Using our property as an example, our estimated additional taxes would be \$314, an increase of 32%. In other words, if you sign this petition, you are supporting about a 32% increase in your property taxes.

(2) An important original concern was that the Pinal Rural Fire Rescue Fire Chief, Bud Paine, had very contentious and un-cooperative relationships with the all the local fire districts and emergency medical providers. Steve Turcotte (the Admiral), the Organizing Chairman of Board of Directors of the PRFR&MD, announced in a Letter to the Editor sent within two days of the Pinal County hearing on August 6, 2014, that Mr. Paine was resigning and moving to Idaho. Although this removes a major concern for many people, it also demonstrates the very undemocratic and autocratic way in which the proposed PRFR&MD will operate. It also makes us question whether the PRFR&MD backers will be able to get along any better than Mr. Paine did with the neighboring fire districts.

(3) Another important concern is that the proposed district appears to be run by non-locals. Rod Prast, the new acting Fire Chief, lives in Mesa and the rest of the potential firefighters all appear to live in Tucson. Steve Turcotte also lives in Tucson and is only at his property in Aravaipa Canyon for a few days each month. Therefore, in contrast to the Dudleyville, Mammoth, and San Manuel fire districts, which are all staffed and run by local, community-oriented residents, the new district would be staffed and run by "outsiders" with little real connection to the local community. Additionally, it is unclear how they would be able to respond to emergencies from so far away.

(4) Further, there appears to be less than 500 people in the proposed district. This is in contrast to about 1300 residents in the Dudleyville FD, 1500 residents in the Mammoth FD, and over 4000 residents in the San Manuel FD. As a result, the proposed district does not appear to have enough people to justify one new fire station, let alone the two stations that they are proposing to maintain and staff. There is also a great deal of undeveloped land with no structures (including the Aravaipa Canyon Wilderness!) in the proposed PRFR&MD. On this land, fires are the responsibility of AZ State Forestry Wildland Fire and a helicopter crew would respond to any medical emergencies, making the inclusion of these lands in the proposed district unnecessary.

(5) The fact that one of the strongest PRFR&MD supporters lives in the Dudleyville FD raises additional questions about their motivation for promoting a new district. Some PRFR&MD backers recently lodged an unfounded complaint with the AZ Attorney General against the Dudleyville FD. This shows that at least some of the motivation for this proposed district is to continue their misplaced vendetta against the Dudleyville FD. Their proposed additional station will be on land donated by the above-mentioned supporter in the Dudleyville FD (their

existing fire station is actually in the Mammoth FD). What does that indicate about their future plans?

There may be some areas of the proposed district where there is sufficient residential density to justify inclusion in a taxing fire district, such as along Highway 77 and in Aravaipa Canyon. However, it would make more sense for those residents, if they so chose, to join one of the existing fire districts. The additional tax revenue would allow those districts to improve their equipment and training. It appears that the PRFR&MD supporters are bringing in "outside experts" because they

think local residents are incapable of increasing the level of available services. If the PRFR&MD backers were sincere in their claim that they want to improve services for our area, instead of proposing an entirely new underfunded district, they would support the commonsense, limited expansion of the existing districts. We strongly urge the property owners of this proposed fire district not to sign the PRFR&MD petitions.

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Oracle Historical Society presents the Power Shootout

The Power Shootout took place in 1918, a time when patriotism was at a fever pitch. The United States had entered World War I in April of 1917. The Selective Service Act of 1917 resulted in 2.8 million men being drafted into military service within a two year period. Freedom of speech and other civil rights were curtailed making it illegal to speak out against the government's war efforts. Workers were prevented from strike activity and union organizing was seen as disloyalty to the United States. The anti union rhetoric and war propaganda would allow local law enforcement and mine owners to deport hundreds of mine workers at gunpoint who were seen as union agitators. Many of these workers were Mexican. The Industrial Workers of the World (IWW) were targeted for their anti-war stance and union activities. The Jerome and Bisbee deportations in Arizona were influenced by this.

In Graham County the Power family living in the rugged Galiuro Mountains may have been a target of Graham County law enforcement officials. On the early morning of Feb. 9, 1918 four lawmen, Graham County Sheriff R.F. "Frank"





McBride, under Sheriff Kane Wootan, Deputy Martin Kempton and US Deputy Marshal Frank Haynes took up positions outside of the Power cabin. They were there to arrest brothers John and Tom Power for draft evasion a misdemeanor under the law at that time. Inside the cabin were the father Jeff Power, brothers Tom and John and hired hand Tom Sisson. Shortly after sunrise, Jeff Power opened the cabin door. What happened next is a matter of conjecture and controversy. Gunfire erupted from both sides. When the firing stopped and the smoke cleared, McBride, Wootan and Kempton lay dead. Jeff Power was dying and the Power boys were injured. Deputy US Marshal Haynes had fled during the shooting

Sisson and the Power boys would flee towards Mexico becoming the target of the largest manhunt in Arizona history up until that time. The story of the Power Shootout and the aftermath has been told in at least seven different books. The controversy and conspiracy theories are still debated today. Who shot first and why? Was it murder or self defense? Did some of the lawmen have alternative motives for going up to the Power cabin? A new documentary film "Power's War" by Director Cameron Trejo is in production. It hopes to answer many of the questions and tell the story of that fateful day. The historical consultant for the film will be speaking at the Acadia Ranch Museum in

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
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PCSO's Peoble wins eight titles, sets national record at shooting contest

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Call 520.896.9545 www.FamilyFirstPec.org Pinal County Sheriff's Office Sergeant Doug Peoble, a San Manuel local who is stationed in eastern Pinal County, recently competed in all six competitions of the New Mexico Regional Police Shooting Championship (NMRPSC) held in Albuquerque, New Mexico on September 10 and 11.

Officer Peoble's fired a total of 516 rounds as he participated in all six competitions of which the NMRPSC is comprised.. He also competed in a two man team event with a Customs and Border Protection Officer winning 2nd Place overall and winning the individual Expert Division in the National Police Shooting Championships (NPSC) from Monday, September 15 through Thursday, September 18, also held in Albuquerque.

The attendance for the competition was over 200 shooters from all across the country and a few International competitors from Germany and Australia. Due to Sgt. Peoble's high scores during the regional shoot he advanced to the Master Class. He competed in all nine of the competitions.

At the conclusion of the NPSC he ranked 4th overall. He

was able to secure eight National Championship Titles and one National Record. The following are the National Championship awards he earned;

Distinguished Revolver, scoring 593 out of 600 possible points, Distinguished Auto, scoring 599 out of 600 possible points, NRA Presidents award, scoring 1192 points out of 1200 possible points, Semi Auto Pistol Match 9, scoring 180 points out of 180 possible points, High Scoring Sheriff Deputy 3000 Aggregate, Master Division Grand Champion, High Scoring Sheriff Deputy Grand Champion, and National Record for the Production Semi-Auto Championship. During this competition Sgt. Peoble competed in the 48 round course and set a National Record of 478 points out of 480 possible points.

Sheriff Paul Babeu stated, "Firearms training and proficiency is an essential developed skill for law enforcement officers. In order to best protect our Pinal families, our deputies must be well trained and highly disciplined. Sgt. Peoble's success not only makes us very proud, he serves as an example for all."
