She graduated from Emerson High School, Gary, Indiana in 1937 and received a three-year nursing diploma from St. Mary's Hospital, Gary, Indiana in 1941.

She was known in the community as the head nurse at Magma Copper Company, San Manuel Division. She began her career at San Manuel Hospital in 1956 and retired from there in 1981. Her duties included working in the emergency room and the obstetrical patient's delivery room.

She worked in many facets of the medical field. Her previous nursing experience included working at Sacramento County Hospital; Magma Copper, Superior

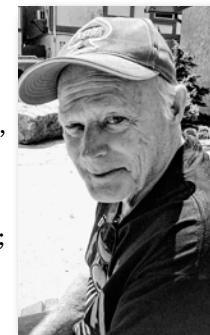

Slump in global economy - layoffs hit local area

Sept. 1, the first day of the last quarter of 2015, Copper is selling at \$2.31 a pound and 381 mine workers are looking for a new job.

Last week both ASARCO and Freeport McMoRan made announcements that they would lay off workers and reduce production at their operations in the Copper Corridor. The recent crumbling of the stock market in China has reduced the

prices for commodities like copper and oil. This has left most investors worried and the trickle down effect of the slump in China has affected the main industry of the Copper Corridor.

ASARCO plans to shut down the concentrator at Hayden indefinitely and will reduce its stripping and leaching output. This reduction affected 211 jobs at the Ray Pit and Hayden operations. Freeport McMoRan will reduce its production and is expected to lay off 170 from Miami pit operations. The rod plant and smelter will not be affected by the reduction as this time.

It is unknown at this time if the majority of those laid off were from the Copper Corridor area or if they were workers from the metropolitan areas.

Following the announcements of the lay offs, Ray Unified School district announced that anyone with students at RUSD who was affected by the lay offs should go to the cafeteria to apply for the free and reduced lunch program. Pinal County and the Department of Economic Security have many resources to help those who may be looking for assistance during this time.

Mammoth Town Council still considering fate of police department

Things are still very much up in the air about the Mammoth Police Department. Should the Pinal County Sheriff's Office take over? Are there other options?

Mammoth Mayor Don Jones late last month voiced some of these concerns at a meeting with the other council members.

Jones spoke about the Council still trying to resolve the issue with the Mammoth Police Department. The numbers are not adding up at this time for the Pinal County Sheriff's Office to take over. Paul Babeu, Pinal County Sheriff, has offered to take over the department at a cost of \$320,000. The town can only budget \$250,000, which has set everything at a bit of an impasse.

Jones said the council is looking at the Arizona Department of Public Safety coming in temporarily to take over the department for 90 days and see what is needed and ways to improve the force. The Town of Kearny has twice in the past year used DPS to temporarily head up its police department.

Recalls

Also at the Aug. 20 meeting, the Mammoth Council voted 4 to 2 to amend Town Ordinance 196, Recall and Removal of Office. The amendment adding section 2.12.030 says "A recalled Council member who has been removed from office shall thereafter be ineligible to serve or hold town office for a period of the lesser of four Town Council election cycles or a period of eight years or be eligible to serve as an appointed town council member." A previous version of the ordinance said that a person recalled could never again hold office. Council members Pete Gallego and Rogina Medina voted against the measure.

In other business, the council:

- Made plans to install a sign on Hwy. 77 directing people to the "Mammoth Aquatics Center."
- Approved renovation of the Little League baseball field. Six inches of dirt will be removed from the field.
- Discussed plans to build a front porch in front of the Town Hall. The work will be done by Public Works.
- Discussed and approved charging service fees for water meter disconnects, re-connects and re-reads. Charges will be \$100 for a new meter and \$100 for a shut off valve. A meter re-read will cost \$15. A shut off service charge will be \$15 during normal

work hours and \$45 after hours or on weekends. The Town will give a 60-day notice to the public before implementing the charges.

- Approved a measure to assess a \$100 non-refundable fine and \$15 per day fine for property owners that fail to do property clean up after being warned by Planning & Zoning. A \$30 service fee will be charged property owners for vegetation/brush pick-up for the clean up program associated with vacant property.
- Approved an end of summer celebration at the Mammoth swimming pool. The celebration will be on Sept. 12. It will be a free fun day with the Lions Club and Mammoth Volunteer Fire Department providing hot dogs and drinks.

Mammoth Police Report

According to state law, police may arrest suspected offenders by two methods. The suspect may be physically taken into the department and booked into jail, or the arresting officer may write a citation and release the suspect to appear in court later. All suspects are presumed innocent until proven guilty in a court of law. Only criminal citations are listed. All damage amounts are estimates.

Items are given to the San Manuel Miner by the Mammoth Police Department and reflect information available at the time the report is compiled.

Miners' look to younger players to fill open spots

Sort of new San Manuel football head coach Dave Jungbluth is counting on a number of underclassmen to fill the void at some key positions after the graduation of a number of senior players who were on last year's roster.

"We have one starting senior back – Michael Sanchez," Jungbluth recently told The Miner. "He played offense and that's about it. We have eight seniors but only three played last year."

Jungbluth, who served as the Miners' defensive coordinator in the 1990s, expects the entire offensive backfield to be sophomores, including his quarterback who missed the majority of last season with injury.

"We're young and inexperienced," Jungbluth said.

Despite the inexperience on this year's roster, Jungbluth knows he has some talented players to work with.

Returning players Antonio Gallego, a junior, and sophomore Fabian Russo are two of only a few returning starters from last year. Transfers Gabriel and Christian Velasquez, both sophomores, are two more talented players who figure to play at both the running back and linebacker positions.

Familiarity between Jungbluth and the players should help with the coaching transition.

"We have over 42 kids coming out this year and they know me," Jungbluth said. "They know my coaching style – I'm not a screamer or a yeller."

Jungbluth expects the Miners to be a good rushing team with a big offensive line paving the way for the young running backs.

"We did a pretty good job running the ball between the tackles," he said. "Our offensive line is somewhat experienced. Our strength is the offensive line and we'll go as far as our offensive line goes."

Of course, Jungbluth, like all coaches this time of year, put the

always present health disclaimer out there, saying health is the most important factor to the success of his team.

Jungbluth said he's been most impressed with the work ethic his teams has displayed so far in the preseason and believes it will translate to success on Friday nights.

"I can't tell you how pleased I am with how hard they are working now," said Jungbluth, adding that there's been a

dramatic change in that area since the summer. "I want our kids to have a good attitude, be coachable, and improve each week."

The Miners, one of only a few teams who have yet to play a game this season, open this Friday against Miami, which is coming off a bye week. The Vandals were impressive in their opener two weeks ago, defeating Willcox, 58 – 6.

Friday's kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m.
