Woody Cline Announces Candidacy for Supervisor

My name is Woody Cline and I am running for re-election for Gila County Supervisor District III. I am a cattle rancher and a small business owner. And I know firsthand how tough this year has been on our constituents and businesses owners.

I spent 19 years working for the United States Forest Service in fire and land management. This experience has helped me to be able to work with the issues we face during these catastrophic fires as well as the

after effects.

I have heard a number of times that the county doesn't do enough for economic development. I have attended a number of planning sessions and meetings since I have been in office. We have several problems that need to be addressed while we are recruiting businesses into our area. Some of the issues continually brought up are: broadband, housing, and the appearance of our communities.

Businesses have indicated that they cannot

or will not locate in Gila County because we don't have reliable high-speed internet. County staff has worked diligently for the last few years on this issue and we are now in a great position to make that happen. The county recently obtained a \$19M E-rate grant that will expand broadband for education and new infrastructure to provide high speed internet county-wide to every school and library. This grant allows Gila County to take advantage of a once in a lifetime opportunity to provide high speed internet

to the schools and libraries at zero cost to the local communities. Just recently, the Board of Supervisors funded a broadband study, further emphasizing that reliable connectivity is key to economic development.

Gila County is a beautiful county and has a number of recreation and tourism opportunities. To capitalize and promote those opportunities and increase tourism the county launched the Discover Gila County website in 2018. The website not only

Copper Area News is committed to providing our readers with as much information as possible. We post a daily update on our Facebook page with the total positive COVID-19 Data. This graph shows the daily counts of positive cases for the past week as of press time on Sept. 28, 2020.

There are a few points we would like our readers to consider when following this data.

1. This will continue to be a rolling total of positive cases. It does not reflect recoveries or deaths. The Arizona Department of Health Services does not break out this data.
2. If you see a reduction in numbers from day to day it is most likely due to a data entry error or mis-coding of a zip code (at the state level).
3. This is all zip code based data; most of our zip codes include unincorporated areas. There is no way to track exactly which areas each of the positive cases are. Example, Kearny and Winkelman each have small communities in their zip code that are not in the Town's incorporated boundaries.
4. If you live in Gila County, please follow the Gila County Health and Emergency Management, Facebook. They have maintained their data on recoveries and current positive cases.
5. You can follow other data such as ICU bed use, Ventilator use and hospital capacity online: <https://bit.ly/3inh280>

Resolution Copper fulfills back-to-school needs for hundreds of local students and teachers

Superior, Ariz., Sept. 22, 2020 - Resolution Copper announced today that the company has awarded more than \$185,000 in grants to five local school districts for the upcoming school year.

Along with supplying personal protective equipment (PPE) for teachers and students, the funds will ensure that up to 600 students in the Superior, Globe, Hayden, Miami and Ray school districts will receive technology to support distance learning.

The grants were designed to enable each school district to use the funds for their specific needs, whether it was additional PPE, tablets and other devices, or expanded

internet connectivity and data plans to facilitate virtual learning.

"Without the iPads, the district would not have had the option to offer distance learning which is life saver during the COVID 19 pandemic. The grant provided our students with 21st century learning tools to make distance learning possible," said Jeff Gregorich, Hayden Winkelman Unified School District Superintendent. The Arizona Trail Association (ATA) has arranged a special online "Trailhead Talk" with United States Senate candidates Martha McSally (R) and Mark Kelly (D) on Friday, Oct. 2. These one-on-one conversations will provide each candidate an opportunity to share their personal connection to the Arizona Trail and speak about the importance of public lands, outdoor recreation, and conservation. The ATA invites everyone to join the conversation through Facebook Live with Mark Kelly at 12:30 p.m., and Martha McSally at 3:30 p.m.

As they seek to represent Arizona in the United States Senate in the upcoming election, both candidates will be asked questions about:

- Protecting public lands
- Improving access to public lands for underserved communities
- Supporting Arizona's outdoor recreation economy
- Addressing climate change and minimizing impacts of wildfires
- Other legislative goals important to the outdoor community

According to the 2020 Economic Value of Trails in Arizona, an estimated 59.2% of Arizona's adult population (or 3,073,100 Arizonans) engaged in non-motorized trail use in the past year. Since the Arizona Trail has been a unifying force across party lines for nearly three decades and Arizona's outdoor recreation community represents a diversity of constituents throughout the

CASA of Arizona celebrates 35 years; volunteers have been changing children's lives in Arizona since 1985

(Gila County, Ariz.— Sep. 25, 2020) Court Appointed Special Advocates (CASAs) have been standing up for children in Arizona's foster care system for 35 years. CASA volunteers are everyday people who get to know the kids to whom they are appointed, talk with everyone involved in the case and help judges identify the best outcome for the child. More than 25,000 children in Arizona have benefitted from having a CASA volunteer on their side.

The CASA program began in Seattle, Washington in 1977 when juvenile court judge David Soukup decided he needed an unbiased source to help guide him in juvenile cases. Pima County, Arizona started the second program in the nation in 1979 and CASA of Arizona was formed in October of 1985. The Arizona legislature passed a bill in 1991 that allowed CASA of Arizona to claim 30 percent of unclaimed lottery winnings. The funding mechanism allowed CASA of Arizona to open a CASA program in all of Arizona's 15 counties.

"We're proud of the growth CASA of Arizona has experienced over 35 years," said Deidre Calcoate, Program Manager for CASA of Arizona. "We have such dedicated volunteers who are changing the lives of children who have experienced abuse and/or neglect. This is not easy work, but we know it is important work. In a system that is so overwhelmed, our volunteers provide an extra set of eyes and ears for juvenile judges who make life changing decisions for children in out of home care."

Children with a CASA volunteer are more likely to receive services, twice as likely to find a safe, permanent home, and half

as likely to re-enter the foster care system. Unfortunately, only 1 in 5 children in foster care in Arizona get the support of a CASA volunteer.

There are nearly 1,200 CASA volunteers serving children in Arizona. During the 35th anniversary, CASA of Arizona is encouraging more people to get involved.

More about CASA

The CASA program is administered by the Arizona Supreme Court and has programs in all 15 Arizona counties. County programs recruit and train community-based volunteers to speak up for the rights of abused and neglected children in court. CASA volunteers are appointed by judges to foster children who have the greatest need for an advocate. Volunteers do not provide placement or a home for the child but are strictly advocates who submit their recommendations directly to the judge hearing a child's case. CASA volunteers complete 30 hours of training to prepare them for their duties.

Child Abuse Statistics

- In fiscal year 2020, the statewide Child Abuse Hotline received 155,905 calls.
- Neglect is the most common form of child abuse followed by physical abuse.

- The majority of children who are in out-of-home care in Arizona (44.6%) are ages 0 to 5.

CASA Volunteers

- Volunteers must be at least 21 years old.
- Volunteers go through a rigorous screening process including interviews, reference check, a fingerprint check, child welfare history check, and a polygraph exam.
- Volunteers are asked to make a commitment to one case until its conclusion, typically involving 15-20 hours per month.
- Volunteers must complete 30 hours of pre-service training.
- CASA volunteers build a 360-degree view of the child and his or her surroundings. To do this, they meet with teachers, counselors, physicians, care takers, etc.
- CASA volunteers work to ensure that children are in safe, permanent homes where they can thrive.

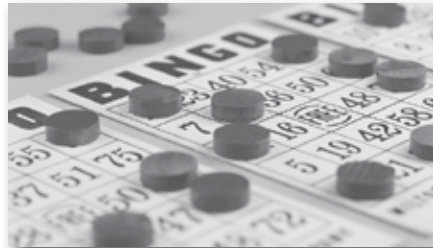

promotes our recreational opportunities, but it also promotes local businesses, restaurants, events and highlights our western heritage. Here is a sample of some of our most recent numbers: Close to 65,000 visitors to the website in 2020; over 2,500 people have liked the page in 2020 alone; 9,479 Facebook followers and 1,233 Instagram followers. In 2019 the website won the Golden Prospector Award of Merit from the Arizona Association of Economic Development.

We have accomplished a lot as a board since I have been in office and you have to work together in order to get the major issues handled. However, I have had some projects that I tackled that have affected not only District III, but all of Gila County as well.

When I ran for office in 2016, one of the issues declared in my campaign was youth work programs to help build our local workforce. In 2018, I pledged \$50,000 from my budget to fund the workers that were placed in the cities and towns in Gila County. I have worked with the Tonto National Forest staff to implement a Youth Conservation Corp crew in Gila County and that was funded this summer with a crew working in the Payson and Tonto Basin areas. We are currently working on a grant application for next year, with crews proposed in Payson and Globe.

The first year I was in office, the Hayden Motel was brought to my attention by the Mayor of Hayden. After looking into it, there were a lot of issues with the building. There were delinquent taxes and the lien was in the State of Arizona's name, there was suspected lead and asbestos in the building materials, and it was literally falling down due to a micro-burst that occurred in 2010. Working with the Governor's Office, the Arizona Department of Revenue and the Arizona Department of Environmental Quality we obtained title to the property and just recently the last of the old building was torn down and the

lot will become a large pull out area for travelers.

When I first came into office, I noticed the senior centers were requesting funds to help with their budgets. After looking into the issue, I found that funding over the years had gradually been cut to the point where they were really struggling to make ends meet. We developed a formula based on the number of seniors that received home delivered meals and case management services and after discussion with county management we now include the senior centers as a line item in our budget. My office also applied for \$50,000 to Resolution Copper's COVID-19 community outreach program for the Hayden Senior Center and the application was awarded. I feel that taking care of our seniors is a moral and social obligation.

I feel that I have gotten a lot done, but I have more to do. A project that I have spent a great deal of time on is obtaining ownership of the Tonto National Forest Pleasant Valley Administrative Site in Young, Arizona. Gila County would become the owner of 85 acres of beautiful forest service land along with a number of buildings. Our plan is to work with a non-profit to provide veteran's services that would include a retreat facility. We are in the final stages of obtaining a permit which will allow a non-profit to begin providing services, but the ultimate goal is to gain ownership for the County.

I also want to gather our cities and towns and community groups together twice a year to discuss local issues and to provide updates to each other regarding projects and local issues. This will help to continue to build on the unity we have been fostering for the last four years.

Again, I am running for Re-Election for Gila County Board of Supervisors District III. I would appreciate your vote on November 3. A vote for Woody Cline is a vote for Gila County.

state, this is an opportunity for candidates to speak directly to Arizona voters.
