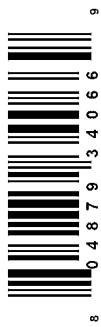

Lydia 'Lilly' Romero Rabago

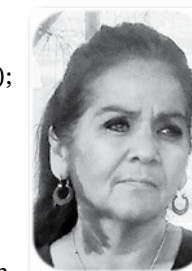

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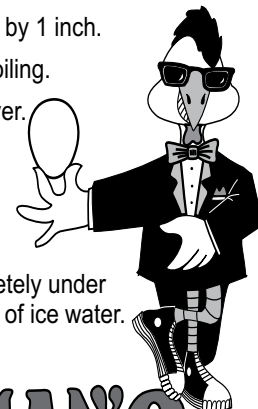

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Superior dominates in (delayed) season opener

The No. 3-ranked Superior football team finally started its season last Friday night at Valley Lutheran and did so in dominating fashion, scoring 54 first-half points and its way to a 54 - 0 shutout victory.

"It was good to come out and knock a little dust off the pads," Superior head coach Ryan Palmer said following the win. "Overall, it was a good team effort; a good team win and we started the season off on the right track."

The Panthers' offensive performance was no surprise, but the defense was equally dominant, limiting the Flames to negative 34 yards of total offense in the game. Valley Lutheran did not gain a first down until the fourth quarter.

Palmer took issue with those who believe the Panthers' are lacking on the defensive side of the ball.

"I think that's false," he said of his defense's reputation. "I think if you look back to last year, we only play our starters for a half if we are (holding a big lead). I'm going to let all the kids get some reps. Even the second group stepped up and played assignment football (against Valley Lutheran)."

Senior quarterback Nicolaus Cruz showed why he's a Player of the Candidate after completing 8-of-10 passes for 146 yards and two touchdowns in the first quarter alone. He also rushed for 94 yards and two more touchdowns before his night ended at halftime.

Senior two-way standout Edgar Galindo added 177 rushing yards and two touchdowns in also only one half of playing time. Senior Austin Navarrette and junior Marcos Bueno each hauled in touchdown receptions.

Jalon Murray, a senior, and Bueno each had 3.5 sacks to lead the defense. Freshman Gabriel Otero had a team-high six tackles in the win.

With the Panthers expected to dominate most opponents, finding correctable errors could be difficult, but coaches are always looking for those areas and moments where they can help their teams improve.

"The big thing is ball security," answered Palmer when asked to name an area where his team needs to improve. "We had a couple of receivers drop some passes and we put a ball on the ground. I'd like to see us make sure we're securing the ball and playing disciplined football."

The Panthers' play their home opener this Friday in what could be their toughest regular season game against No. 2 St. David. Kickoff is scheduled for 7 p.m.

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Babeu coattails shrink as Henry and Voyles lose to Lamb and Volkmer in August 30 primary

Superior voters remove Valenzuela from office, elect Besich-Lira as Mayor

Pinal County voters spoke on Aug. 30 in the Arizona Primary Election, and their words were anything but pleasant for County Attorney Lando Voyles, District 2 Supervisor Cheryl Chase, Superior Mayor Jayme Valenzuela and Kearny Mayor Sam Hosler. All four saw their terms of office cut short at the ballot box.

And while the Town Councils of Kearny, Mammoth and Superior will see plenty of new faces as a result of the Aug. 30 election, on the county level voters mostly re-nominated incumbents to represent their parties on the Nov. 8 ballot.

One trend from the primary election is that the political muscle of two-term Pinal County Sheriff Paul Babeu may be on the wane. While he won the Republican nomination over five other candidates in the First Congressional District with 32.5% of the vote, the candidates Babeu endorsed did not fare as well.

Mark Lamb, a former Pinal County Deputy (2012-14) and Detective with the Salt River Police Department, easily defeated Babeu's Chief Deputy Steve Henry for the Republican nomination for Pinal County Sheriff. And Kent Volkmer, president of the Pinal County Bar Association, beat Babeu loyalist and incumbent Lando Voyles by more than 5,000 votes for the Republican nomination for Pinal

County Attorney.

Henry and Voyles ran an extensive campaign as the "Law and Order Team," blanketing county roads with groups of signs touting the criminal threats to the county before reaching their joint poster in a manner reminiscent of the Burma Shave advertising campaign of yore. But voters opted for the quitter separate campaigns of Lamb and Volkmer. Lamb did especially well among voters in San Tan Valley where his campaign signs were not seen before homes on subdivision streets.

Lamb will face Kaye Dickson, who convincingly won the Democrat nomination for Sheriff over Kevin Taylor. Dickson campaigned hard on programs to prevent crime and promises to be a working rather than a showboat sheriff.

Babeu will face Democrat Tom O'Halleran to succeed U.S. Senate candidate Ann Kirkpatrick as Congressman in Arizona's First District, which stretches from southern Pinal County to the far northeast corner of the state. Although O'Halleran won the Democrat nomination by more than 7,000 votes throughout the district, his opponent Miguel Olivas topped him by 400 votes in Pinal County.

Among incumbent members of the Pinal County Board of Supervisors, only Cheryl Chase was not renominated by voters. Mike Goodman, a San Tan Valley resident and owner of several local businesses, finished first in a field

of five candidates in the Republican Primary with 1,726 votes (33.8% of the total votes cast). Chase placed second with 1,390 (27.1%), followed by Tisha Castillo, Wayne Bachmann and Manuel R. Vega.

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Contreras promoted: credits ethics, faith and honesty for success

Superior High School graduate Patrick D. Contreras recently earned a major promotion within the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement. He has earned the position of as a Field Office Director (Senior Executive Service) for U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's (ICE) Enforcement and Removal Operations (ERO) in Houston, Texas as of March 2016.

In this position, he directs and executes oversight of immigration enforcement operations in 54 Texas counties which encompasses most of the Gulf Coast. In addition to the field office in Houston, the office is supported by four sub-offices. The Field Office consists of 262 employees and manages over 2,300 detention beds. The Houston Office has the most active Criminal Alien Program which is responsible for all releases from the Texas prison systems and a dynamic 287g program at the fourth largest

county in the nation. There are only 12 people who serve in these positions in the entire federal employment system, roughly one percent of the federal personnel.

Contreras credits the success within his career to the work ethic of his parents, Patrick Sr. and Josie Contreras, and the community of Superior.

"My mom owned one of the local beauty shops," he said. "There was no way to get away with anything, that taught me honesty and integrity. My parents also taught me about how to treat people right."

He began his career working in the mine, where he not only saw how hard the miners worked but also worked right along with them. When the mine closed in 1982 he changed career paths and worked as a private security guard then he moved on to be a detention officer with the state prison in Florence. He has fond memories of working with Mike Fernandez, Willy Guerra and Ralph Cervantes.

"They showed me work ethic and also encouraged me to try different things in my career," he said.

Patrick began his career with Immigration and Customs Enforcement in December 1985 in Florence, Arizona as an Immigration Detention Officer with the former U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS). In 1990, he was promoted to the position of a Deportation Officer in Los Angeles, California. He worked in Los Angeles during the race riots and he determined that living there was not the quality of life he wanted to live in.

"During the race riots there were no cars on

the freeway," he said. "That is not normal for Los Angeles."

In August 1993, he transferred to Phoenix, Arizona as a Deportation Officer until he was promoted in November 1995 to the position of Supervisory Detention and Deportation Officer in Portland, Oregon. He later transferred back to Phoenix, Arizona in August 1997. While in Phoenix, he served as the acting Deputy Assistant District Director, which covered the states of Arizona and Nevada. In December 2002, he was promoted as the Assistant Officer in Charge at the Florence Detention Center (FDC) in Florence, Arizona. He remained at FDC until his promotion to the position of Assistant Field Office Director in Phoenix, Arizona in August 2008.

Arizona remained the home base for he and his family during his career. He and his wife Roberta were active in the St. Francis of Assisi Catholic Church and many other community organizations while they lived here.

Contreras was temporarily promoted as the Deputy Assistant Director for Information Resource Management at ICE Headquarters in Washington, DC from October 2009 until September 2010. In 2013, he was promoted to the Deputy Field Officer Director in Dallas, Texas. He has worked under the policies and direction of five different presidential administrations.

"Despite the rhetoric, we enforce the laws as the are governed in the law books," he explained. Over the years some of the policies and procedures have changed but overall the laws that govern their actions have remained

ORDINANCE NO. 16-138
AN ORDINANCE LEVYING UPON THE ASSESSED VALUATION OF THE PROPERTY WITHIN THE TOWN OF SUPERIOR ARIZONA, SUBJECT TO TAXATION A CERTAIN SUM UPON EACH ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$100.00) OF ASSESSED VALUATION SUFFICIENT TO RAISE THE AMOUNT ESTIMATED TO BE REQUIRED IN THE ANNUAL BUDGET, LESS THE AMOUNT ESTIMATED TO BE RECEIVED FROM OTHER SOURCES OF REVENUE; PROVIDING FUNDS FOR GENERAL MUNICIPAL EXPENSES, ALL FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING THE 30TH DAY OF JUNE 2017.

WHEREAS, by the provisions of State law, the ordinance levying taxes for fiscal year 2016-17 is required to be finally adopted not later than the third Monday in August; and

WHEREAS, the County of Pinal is the assessing and collecting authority for the Town of Superior, the Clerk is hereby directed to transmit a certified copy of this ordinance to the County Assessor and the Board of Supervisors of the County of Pinal, Arizona.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Superior, Arizona, as follows:

SECTION 1: There is hereby levied on each one hundred dollars (\$100.00) of the assessed value of all property, both real and personal within the corporate limits of the Town of Superior, except such property as may be by law exempt from taxation, a primary property tax rate of \$7.3409 for the fiscal year ending on the 30th day of June, 2017. If this tax rate exceeds the maximum levy allowed by law, the Board of Supervisors of the County of Pinal is hereby authorized to reduce the levy to the maximum allowable by law after providing notice to the Town.

SECTION 2: It is the intent of the Town Council of the Town of Superior, Arizona to levy the primary property tax for operations for the Town of Superior for fiscal year 2016-17 will equal \$579,015.00 dollars.

SECTION 4: Failure by the County officials of Pinal County, Arizona, to properly return the delinquent list, any irregularity in assessments or omissions in the same, or any irregularity in any such proceedings shall not invalidate such proceedings or invalidate any title conveyed by any tax deed; failures or neglect of any officer of officers to timely perform any of the duties assigned to him or to them shall not invalidate any proceedings or any deed or sale pursuant thereto, the validity of the assessment or levy of taxes or of the judgement of sale by which the collection of the same may be enforced shall not affect the lien of the Town of Superior upon such property for the delinquent taxes unpaid thereon; overcharge as to part of the taxes or of costs shall not invalidate any proceedings for the collection of taxes or the foreclosure of the lien thereon or a sale of the property under such foreclosure and all acts of officers de facto shall be valid as if performed by officers de jure.

SECTION 5: All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 6: This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage by the Council and approval by the Mayor.

the same.

His advice to others: "Enjoy what you are doing," he said. "It is normal to not know what you are doing. Don't be afraid to be a busboy, talk to people."

He had never imagined that he would advance as in his career like he has, he has much respect for the role his faith, family, friends, mentors and community have played in his life. He recommends surrounding yourself with good people and good things happen to you.

"It is like the old saying: Tell me who your friends are, and I will tell you your future," he said.

Goodman's win was credited to his hard personal campaigning especially in San Tan Valley, where he promised to help bring more jobs and services. Also a supporter of San Tan Valley incorporation, Goodman will face no opposition in November as there is no official Democrat candidate slated.

In other Pinal County Board of Supervisor races, renominated incumbents nominated are Democrat Peter Rios (District 1), Stephen Miller (District 3), Anthony Smith (District 4) and Todd House (District 5). Only Rios will face competition in November from Republican Thomas Sorensen, who ran unopposed for his party's nomination. The other three face no competition in November as the Democrat Party fielded no candidates in the primary.

The local race that had everyone watching was the Recall Election for Mayor of Superior. Incumbent Mayor Jayme Valenzuela was easily ejected from office by Town Council member Mila Besich-Lira, who received 516 votes to Valenzuela's 151 votes. The recall election was called in April as nearly double the necessary citizen signatures were secured in response to the discovery last December that Valenzuela had used the town debit eight times for personal matters, including a visit to the Wild Horse Pass Casino.

Besich-Lira will assume the position of Mayor of

Superior at the Sept. 8 Town Council Meeting.

Membership on Superior's Town Council also will change. Voters reelected Vice Mayor Olga D. Lopez, along with new members Vanessa Navarrette and Bruce Armitage. Incumbent John A. Tameron and Carl W. (Bill) Vogler did not receive sufficient votes.

There also will be turnover on the Town Councils of Kearny and Mammoth.

Debra Sommers nosed out incumbent Sam Hosler at Kearny Mayor by only 29 votes. However, the race was close and Sommers getting just under 50% of the vote, a runoff election could be staged in November. Whether a runoff is needed will be determined when the official election results are issued on Sept. 7, said Kearny Town Clerk Cathy Woolery.

On the Town Council, only Sheila Stephenson was reelected to a new term. Securing the most votes for Council seats were Rose Bradford and Samantha Mista. Failing to win reelection was David Herrera.

In Mammoth, only Mayor Frances Wickham was reelected to the Town Council on Aug. 30. New Council members, all of whom received more votes than Wickham, were Alvaro Anaya, Joe Dietz and Frances Amparno. Council incumbents not reelected were Vice Mayor Joe Brewer and Bob Sloan, as was Bart Goff. In Mammoth, voters elect the Council but Council members vote among

themselves as to who serves as Mayor and Vice Mayor.

Other Pinal County races decided on August 30 include only one contested race where for County Accessor incumbent Republican Douglas Wolf will face Democrat Jacqueline Minto. For the other positions Republicans will run unopposed, which are Recorder Virginia Ross, Superintendent of Schools Jill Broussard and Treasurer Michael McCord.

November matchups for State Senate seat mostly in Pinal County will be in District 8 incumbent Democrat Barbara McGuire against Republican Frank Pratt, District 11 incumbent Republican Steve Smith against Democrat Ralph Atchue, and District 16 incumbent Republican David Farnsworth against Democrat Scott Prior. For State House of Representatives seats, the matchups are in District 8 Thomas (T.J.) Shope (incumbent) and David Cook against Democrat Carmen Casillas, District 11 incumbent Republicans Mark Finchan and Vince Leach against Democrat Corin Hammond, and District 16 incumbents Kelly Townsend and Doug Coleman against Democrats Sharon Stinard and Cara Prior.
